The light apparatus is is esticular, of the fourth order. The light is fixed, and red.

The elevation of the focus of light from the level of the sea is 18 3 metres, and it is visible in clear weather at a distance of eleven miles, and it lilumines the whole horizon.

The geographical position of the light is in lat. 43 32 45 N., fon. 7 55 east of Paris.
