MEETING OF THE PARK COMMISSION .- An ad-

journed meeting of the above Commissioners took place yesterday at the Mayor's office, Hon. Morton McMichael, President, in the chair, and Joseph F. Marcer. President of Common Council, Secretary. Present—Messrs. Brown, Cuyler, Dixie, Graeff, Kneass, Meade, Phillips, Price, Remak, Spering, and Welsh.

In answer to a communication sent to the City Controller as to appropriations for land purchases, improvements, atc., the following

purchases, improvements, etc., the following reply was received:—"The appropriation for improvements embraces all costs, except the salary of the Superintendent, and being in one item, it could not be separated, except by examination of each bill, which would involve a delay of some weeks. The subjoined statement will, I trust, prove satisfactory:-For improvements of Fairmount Park from 1857 to date in 1867, inclusive, \$129,143-69; cost of Sedgely Park, \$75,000; Lansdown estate, \$84,953-30; making a total of \$289,096-99. A communication was received from Mr. Hyneman in reference to sprinkling roads at Park, which was referred to Committee on Superin-

dence and Police. A communication was also received in reference to erecting a bridge over the Schuylki I at Bridge street, which was referred to Committee on Plans and Improvements.

Mr. Haines offered the following:-That the Resident Physicians hereafter elected shall serve for the period of litteen months from the time they shall commence their duties; and those already elected and acting, whose terms would expire on the lot of October next, are continued until January 1, 1868; and the existing rules are modified to conform to this change.

Another Explosion .- Vesterday afternoon, about two o'clock, an explosion took place at Hayes & Ellis' lumber yard and steam saw mill, No. 4752 Frankford avenue. The explosion was caused by an accumulation of gas in the furnace under the boilers. It appears that a quantity of shavings had been placed in the furnace by the fireman, who was firing up preparatory to starting the engine, which caused the gas to accu-mulate to such an extent that the doors of the furraces flew open, and the gas rushed out, causing the walls round the boilers, about six feet high, to be thrown down. The supports are also knocked from under the boilers, and it will be necessary to reset the botters before they can be used. At the time of the disaster, number of the workmen were standing in front of the boilers, two of whom-James Stewart, the engineer, and Samuel Hart, a workman-were slightly scorched in their backs. The boilers are side by side, and are each twenty-five horse power, and have been in use about four een years. They were examined about Christmas, and are considered sound, although before being again used they will be thoroughly over-It is thought that the damages will be repaired in a few days, and that but little delay in consequence will be caused by the accident.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Capialn Sprague, late master of the brig Kurea, desires to warn shipmasters trading to St. Domingo against a dangerous reef, not laid down in the chart nor noticed in any sailing directions, and on which he tost his vessel May 6, 1867.

It is about five miles south of Cabelle Bay, Saona falase, the SE, extremity of St. Domingo Island. At low water it is nearly a wash, and apparently from 1000 to 2009 yards long, and 2009 yards wide.

At St. Domingo City, where Capitain Sprague went in his boat for assistance, nothing was known of the existence of this danger.

The authorities at Washington have been communicated with in reference to it, and it is believed that our vessels of war will be instructed to determine its position and extent. position and extent.

As Captain Sprague went back to his vessel and removed the cargo he had a good opportunity to determine the distance of the shoat from Saona.

On the 15th of May, 1867, on the south head of the curved breakwater of the port of Legisorn, besides the present lenticular lantern with a red light, another similar light of a white color will be shown, situated two metres perponticularly below the red one.

The second white light is thirteen metres above the sea, and has been added to prevent the sea light of Melevia from being mistaken for that of the same color at the southern head of the breakwater of the harbor.

A green buoy, marked with the word "Wreck." been laid sixteen lathoms north of a vessel sunk near the English and Welsa Grounds Lightvessel. The buoy lies in seven fathoms at low water spring tides, with the following mark and compass bear-A clump of trees on Bleadon Hill in line with the

west point of Middle Hope beach, S. & W.

English and Welsh Grounds Lightvessel E.SE., distant nine-tenths of a mile.


