GENERAL LONGSTREET'S LETTER ON RECONSTRUCTION.

The following is the text of General Longstreet's letter upon reconstruction, in reply to a communication addressed to him by John M.

NEW ORLEANS, La., June 3.—Your esteemed favor of the 15th ult. was duly received. I was pleased to have the opportunity to heat Senator Wilson, and was agreeable surprised to meet such fairness and Irankness in a politician whom I have been taught to believe uncompromisingly opposed to the white people of the south.

promisingly opposed to the white people of the south.

I have maturely considered your suggestion to "wisely unite in efforts to restore Louisiana to her former position in the Union, through the party now in power." My letter of the 6th of April, to which you refer, clearly indicates a desire for practical reconstruction and reconciliation. Practical men can surely distinguish between practical reconstruction and reconstruction as an abstract question. I will endeaver, however, with renewed energy, to meet your wishes in the matter. The serious difficulty that I apprehend is the want of that wisdom which is necessary for the great work. I shall be kappy to work in any harness that promises relief to our distressed people and harmony to the mation. It matters not whether I bear the mantle of Mr. Davis or the mantle of Mr. Summer, so that I may heip to bring the glory of "peace and good-will towards men."

I shall set out by assuming a proposition, that I hold to be self-evident, viz.—The highest of human laws is the law that is established by appear to arms.

human laws is the law that is established by appeal to arms.

The great principles that divided political parties prior to the war were thoroughly discussed by our wisest statesmen. When argument was exhausted resort was had to compromise. When compromise was unavailing, discussion was renewed, and expedients were sought, but none could be found to suit the emergency. Appeal was finally made to the sword, to determine which of the claims was the true construction of constitutional law. The sword has decided in favor of the North, and what they claimed as principles cause to be and what they claimed as principles cease to be principles, and are become law. The views that we hold cease to be principles because they are opposed to law. It is therefore our duty to abandon ideas that are obsoiete, and conform to the requirements of law.

THE HIGHER LAW. The Military bill, and amendments, are peace offerings. We should accept them as such, and place curselves upon them as the starting point place curselves upon them as the starting point from which to meet fu ure political issues as they arise. Like other Southern men, I naturally sought alliance with the Democratic party, merely because it was opposed to the Republican party. But as far as I can judge, there is nothing tangible about it, except the issues that were staked upon the war, and there lost. finding nothing to take hold of except prejudice, which cannot be worked into good for any one, it is proper and right that I should seek some standpoint from which good may

IMPRACTICABLE ISSUES OF THE DEMOCRACY. If I appreciate the principles of the Demo-If I appreciate the principles of the Demo-cratic party, its prominent features oppose the enfranchisement of the colored man, and deny the right to legislate upon the subject of suf-frage, except by the Sta es individually. These two features have a tendency to exclude Southern men from that party; for the colored man is already enfranchised here, and we cannot seek alliance with a party that would restrict his rights. The excusive right of the States to legislate upon suffrage will make the enfranchisement of the placks make the enfranchisement of the clacks, whether for better or for worse, a fixture

It appears, therefore, that those who cry loudest against this new order of things as a ublic calabity are trose whose principles rould fix it upon us without a remedy. Hence it becomes us to insist that suffrage should be extended in all of the States, and fully tested. The people of the North should adopt what The people of the North should adopt what they have forced upon us; and if it be proved to be a mistake, they hould remove it by the remody under republican principles of uniform laws upon suffrage.

If every man in the country will meet the crisis with a proper appreciation of our condition, and come fairly up to his responsibilities, on to moreower the sum will small among a happy
