THE LITTLE BOY GALLAGHER.-We naranied in our issue of Saturday that a man named How-avd Alloutt, threw a stone at a boy named Thomas Gallagher, drinking at a hydrant in front of a row of name building in a hydrant in front of a row of new buildings, in Carpenter street, above Nine-teenth, and that the boy died shortly afterwards from the effect of the blow. The facts seem to be that the workmen upon the

The facts seem to be that the workmen upon the building have been annoyed almost unendurably by boys, who take boards to "see-saw," and are constantly climbing board plies, periling life and limb, and embarrasing the workmen in many ways. The only method of getting rid of this swarm of youngsters is to call for a pollceman, and in this locality a pollceman's beat is literally a journey in extent. There was an inquest held on Saturday, by Coroner Daniels, upon the body, and the testimony sunexed tells the story. Some of the children were of years so tender that they were not admitted to the witness stand. house." The first witness was a boy about ten years of age, named Francis Pratt, who made the following statement: Tommy and I were getting a drink at the hydrant; I told Tommy to start the hydrant on for me; then a man threw a piece of brick. The witness was asked who that man was, and on looking around pointed out Alicuit, who was al-ting in the room. He continued by saying: I am sure he was the man; he threw it at Tommy and hit in the left side; he walked a short distance and hit in the left side; he walked a short distance and fell down; he was trying to get up, but fell down; a crowd of women then came up and took him into a house; I went down home; when Alloutt threw the brick he was standing at the end of the balld-ing; he hallcoad at us first, and threw a piece of dirt, which hit me; then he picked up a piece of brick which hit Tommy; I saw him pick it up; when Tommy was struck he tried to cry but could not.

John Fletcher said: I am between ten and eleven years of age; I saw Alicutt strike Gallagher with a brick-bat; I was with Pratt and Gallagher getting a drink of water at the hydrant when Alicutt took up the brick and threw it; I saw him pick up the brick bat; Towns follows brick bat; Tommy fell down when he was struck;

there was no other man there. Joseph McMichael sworn -- I am nearly ten years old; met Frank Pratt and Tommy Gallagher coming over the lot, and I asked what was the matter; he said one of the carpenters struck him with a brick; I asked what for, and he said he was going to the hydrant to get a drink; I miked Pratt where he had been; he said he had been at Oarpenwhere he had been, he said he had been at Carpen-ter and Eighteenth; Tommy then fell, and said he couldn't walk any longer; Franz teld him to get upand try to walk, and get home before dark; then he tried to get up, and fell down again; Tommy then vomited blood; a lady picked him up and took him into Mr. Thomas' house.

Elias Thomas testified that after the occurrence he took the child into his house, where he died. Mrs. Peliz deposed that while she had Gallagher in her charge, after being hit, he stated that the man at the building had hit him in the stomach with a brick with a brick. Robert Hines, affirmed .- I was at the buildings

working; heard Mr. Allcutt halloo at the boys paid no attention to it; did not know that anybody had been hurt until some time afterward. Thomas Hannan, sworn -- Was working on the

building at the time; I saw Allcutt throw a piece of dirt about the size of a wainut; it did not hit any one; it was thrown in the direction of the hydrant; the boys did not run then. James Carey, sworn.—I was present at the time; Mr. Alicutt hallooed two or three times to the boys to get away from the hydrant; he then picked

up a piece of dirt and threw it toward the hydran; did not see him throw a piece of brick; when he threw the dirt the boys ran away; Allcutt might

Investigation of the boys in a way, Allott might have thrown a brick without my seeing him; did not hear of any boy having failen off lumber. Dr. Shapleigh affirmed that he made a post-moriem examination of the bedy of deceased; there were no external marks of violence on the body; the spleen was extensively raptured; the cavity of the abdomen was filled with blood; death was caused by hemorrhage; this must have been the result of a violent blow; a piece of brick would have caused it; a piece of dirt, the size of a wal-mat would not nut, would not.

net, would not. The jury then rendered the following verdict: "That the said Thomas Gallagher came to his death by violence (a blow in the stomach by a brick) at the hands of Howard Allcatt, in Carpen-ter street, above Eighteenth, June 14, 1867." The prisoner, who had been in custody since Friday evening, was then committed to prison by the Coroner.

THE REGATTA ON THE SATURDAY, AND THE REVIEW OF THE SCHUYLEILL NAVY TO-DAY .-The interest manifested in the various matches throughout the week on the Schuylkill, was increased to the utmost by the contest of Saturr barge Atalanta the six-oared outris the eight-oared gunnel barge Excelsior, both belonging to the Atslanta Club of New York. both being among the attractions on the river. The being among the attractions on the river. The day was most favorable for the purpose, and Fairmount Park, and all the avenues thereto, were greatly crowded. It is estimated that there were at least three thousand persons present. On the water a number of excursionists went along with the boats in the small steamers that run up and down the river, with a great num-ber of small boats of every kind, from the small skeleton outrigger to the roughest flat bottomed skiff. following six-oared boats were in line The Malta Club. The boats started well together, and the race throughout was well contested, adding much to the excitement of the occasion. and when the Atulanta came in ahead the cheering of the crowd was almost deafening. distance passed over was three miles, and the time was as follows:-Atalanta, 18 minutes 59 seconds; Faugh-a-Ballagh, 19 minutes 7 seconds; and Hiawatha, 19 minutes 45 seconds. The second race was between the four-oared ontrigger boats Onward, of the Neptune Club, and the Cygnet, of the Quaker City Club. The Lotus, of the Bachelor Club, which was originally entered for this race, was withdrawn the day preceding in consequence of the sickness of one of the crew. This race, like its predecessor, was closely contested, the Cygnet winning in 20 minutes 10 seconds; the Onward's time being 21 minutes 19 seconds.

LANCABTER DISTILLERS IN TROUBLE. -- On Esturday Deputy Marshal Sharkey brought to this city J. R. Watkins and Frederick Serer, ex-tensive distillers, residents of Lancaster county, on the charge of baving removed distilled epirits to a place other than to a bonded ware-house. The entire establishment of defendants was seized, consisting of 500 barrels of whisky 138 cows, and 167 pigs. They were to have had a hearing before United States Commissioner Sergeant, but waived it, and entered ball for their appearance at Court.

Isaac White and W. C. Rourke, also of Lanconstar, were up for a hearing before the same Commissioner, on the charge of removing whisky to a place other than to a bonded ware-house. They also entered bail for their appearance at Court.


