

**AFFAIRS IN KANSAS.**

**WHAT FLOODS TO DOSS OF LIFE AT FORT HAYES—**  
**DAMAGE TO THE UNION PACIFIC RAILROAD—**  
 LAW IN PROVISION—DESTRUCTION BY THE  
 FLOODS.

LEANSWORTH, Kansas, June 18—9 o'clock  
 P. M.—The damage to the track of the Union  
 Pacific Railroad by the recent flood has not yet  
 been repaired. A large amount of mail matter  
 has in consequence accumulated at Junction  
 City and Salina. At Fort Hayes on the 11th  
 inst. the water was twenty feet deep. The  
 present water is still deeper. It is necessary  
 to excavate to the roots of the buildings. Six  
 soldiers and a citizen were drowned. General  
 Hancock is engaged selecting another site for  
 the fort on higher ground, ten miles from the  
 present one.

On the 13th inst., while an emigrant train  
 was en camp near Shawnee, Johnson  
 county, Kansas, three young girls attached to  
 it went a short distance to pick strawberries.  
 A negro came upon one of them, and  
 outraged her in a shocking manner. The citizens  
 arrested the negro, and intelligence has just  
 been received that a mob burned him to death  
 on Friday night.

Grasshoppers are doing great damage on  
 both sides of the Missouri river. For a distance  
 of one hundred miles gardens and cornfields  
 are being devastated, and trees stripped of  
 their foliage.

 rate of about \$5,250 per mile, amounting to \$44,362,500.  
 The Company is also permitted to issue its own First  
 Mortgage Bonds to an equal amount, and at the same  
 time, which by SPECIAL ACT OF CONGRESS ARE  
 MADE A FIRST MORTGAGE ON THE ENTIRE  
 LINE, the Bonds of the United States being subordinate  
 to them.

The Government makes a donation of 12,800 acres of  
 land to the miles, and over which it is estimated to  
 be worth \$2,000,000, making the total resources, exclusive  
 of the capital, \$18,416,000; but the full value of the  
 lands cannot now be realized.

 The railroad connection between Omaha and the  
 East is complete, and the earnings of the Union  
 Pacific on the sections already finished for the month  
 of May were \$261,782. These sectional earnings as the  
 road progresses will much more than pay the interest  
 on the Company's bonds, and the through business  
 over the only line of railroad between the Atlantic  
 and Pacific must be immense.

**VALUE AND SECURITY OF THE BONDS.**  
 The Company respectfully submit that the above  
 statement of facts fully demonstrates the security of  
 their Bonds, and as additional proof they would sug-  
 gest that the Bonds now offered are less than ten mil-  
 lion dollars in \$10 miles of road, on which over twenty  
 million dollars have already been expended. On 330  
 miles of the road the cars are now running, and the  
 remaining 187 miles are nearly completed.  
 At the present rate of premium on gold these Bonds  
 pay an annual interest on the present cost of  
**NINE PER CENT.**  
 And it is believed that on the completion of the road,  
 like the Government Bonds, they will go above par.  
 The Company intend to sell but a limited amount at  
 the present low rate, and retain the right to advance  
 the price at their option.
