

THE GREAT PACIFIC LINE.

The Union Pacific Railroad Co.'s First Mortgage Bonds—Are They Secure? This is the first question with every investor. It is not doubted that the great Pacific line will be finished at an early day.

General Sherman says the United States Government could well afford to build the whole road, and would make money by the operation. It is an indispensable national necessity, and by advancing fifty million dollars in its own bonds, and by a donation of 12,800 acres of land per mile, the Government practically guarantees its completion.
