City and County of Philadelphia" took place at the Central High School, Broad and Green streets, yesterday, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Interesting addresses were made by George I. Biche, President of the Institute, who introduced Edward Shippen, Esq., President of the Board of Controllers; Professor Charles J. Stille, of the University of Pennsylvania; Rev. P. S. Hanson; and Professor Wickersham, State Superintendent of Public Schools.

Superintendent of Public Schools.

I. The objects of the Institute are—the improvement of the Teachers of the Public Schools of the city and county of Philadelphia by means of lectures, essays, and discussions upon educational topics; by practical illustration of modes of teaching; by the formation of a Teachers' Library; by reading and other elocutionary exercises, and, at the same time, to create and keep alive a deeper public interest in education.

The Business Committee made a report, in which they state that ample arrangements have been make for the exercises to take place at the been make for the exercises to take place at the meetings in September, December, February, and May. At the meeting in Septembr, Dio Lewis, M. D., will lecture upon his favorite subject of physical exercises in schools. In addition thereto, several other parties have been selected to lecture or lead in discussions on different subjects.
