THE FENIANS.

STEPHEN J. MEANY'S SENTENCE AND PROTEST-HIS REPUDIATION OF THE "HASE OVERTURES" OF THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT.

DUBLIN, June 21 .- Stephen Joseph Meany, who was lately tried for Fenian treason by the Special Commission, was brought into Court before the Judges this morning, and sentenced to fifteen years' imprisonment in a penal con-

Before the passing of the sentence Mr. Meany delivered a speech to the court, in which he protested, as an American citizen, against the prosecution as carried on by the Crown. He claimed the protection of the United States Government. Mr. Meany denied that he had ever been paid for revolutionary or other services by the Fenians in America. He in-dignantly scouted the "base overtures" made to him in his difficulty by the British Government, the officers of which had asked him to give evidence for the Queen against the members of the Fenian party just arrested at Dun-garvan, in the county of Waterford.

The Government also offered him, he said,

his liberty in six months, provided he pleaded guilty to the charges of the indictment, which he, as a man and an American citizen, could not do, knowing that he had not committed a crime.

#### THE ENGLISH RIOTS.

THE LULL CONTINUED IN BIRMINGHAM-ARMED POLICE IN THE STREETS-A RENEWAL OF THE DISTURBANCES PROBABLE.

BIRMINGHAM, June 21.—The full which succeeded the riot of last Tuesday in this city continues. The city police are still armed with cuthasses, which they wear on every occasion on duty. Five hundred special constables had been sworn in, but of these two hundred men had been discharged. Murphy, the anti-Popery lecturer, as he is termed, lectures every night in some one of the halls or public rooms of the town. The disturbances may break out again.

#### OBITUARY. JUDGE LYONS OF RICHMOND.

On the 18th instant, Judge William H. Lyons of Richmond, died of typhold fever, under an attack of which he had suffered for about a month. The Richmond Inquirer says:—'Judge Lyons was the son of the Hon. James Lyons, of this city, and was born in the city of Richmond on the 31st of May, 1831. In 1847 he entered William and Mary College. After one year he centered the University of Virginia, where he continued two annual sessions, taking the academic course, and graduating with the highest honors. He then devoted himself to the study of law under his father, and was soon admitted to the bar." In 1850 he was elected to the office of Judge of the Hustings Court, previous to which time he became lieutenant in a vious to which time he became lieutenant in a Virginia company, in which he served during the late war. He was a very popular man, the gentleness of his disposition winning him hosts of trends.

A NATIONAL BANK RING.

ASSESSMENT TO BUY UP CONGRESS. LOUISVILLE, Ky., June 21.—A New York National Banking house recently sent out cir-culars assessing all the national banks one six-teenth per cent, on their capital, to form a fund to buy up Congress and defeat the opposition of the monopoly.
