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Didot's Historical Sketch-The Imperial Printing Office.

M. Ambroise-Firmin Didot has contributed to the "Paris Guide" an article on Printing in Paris, which has general interest. M. Didot, in facing the art of printing through its many ricissitudes, tells us that it was introduced into Paris in the year 1470 by three Germans, who resorted to that city at the invitation of one Guillaume Fichet, a doctor of theology, and of La Pierre, Prior of the Sorbonne. The books which were first issued from their press appear to have been printed in 1470 and 1471, and in the following few years, having removed from the Sorbonne to the Rue St. Jacques, they executed several works in Gothic and other characters, st their house, which bore the sign of the "Gol-den Sun." In 1478 two of them seem to have returned to Germany, since on a very fine copy of Virgil the name of one of them, Ulrich fering, stands alone, as is also the case in the copy of the most ancient edition of the Brevinry d Paris, in the library of St. Genevieve, and in me following year Gering removed again to a iouse belonging to the Sorbonne, carrying with

The number of printers rapidly increased, ad we hear of one Antoine Verard, who pub-shed a great number of works in remarkably cantiful Gothic character, and after four re-novals, having preserved his sign of St. John he Evangelist to the last, died opposite the Rue Note Dame, leaving his business to his son Barhelemy.

THREE REMARKABLE EVENTS. Henri Estienne, whose family name is so well nown in connection with rate and early edi-ons, came to Paris from Provence in 1500, and partnership with a German named Wolfgang, rinted with great care a hundred and one ifferent works before his death, in 1520. Two years wher, 1515, Francis I exempted them from allitary service, except in case of immi-ent danger to the State, and the same King in 1615 annulled the prohibi-tion which the University had put on the rinting of the Concordat with Pope Leon X. When Henri Estienne died, his widow married printer named Colines, who not only himself produced some very fine editions, but educated his wife's son, Robert Estienne, to the business, which he bequeathed the burning of Erasmus' riend Louis Berquin in the square of 'Greve," Ithough he had been well received by the king, who called him his connsellor. Colines had partnership with a German named Wolfgang, who called him his counsellor. Colines had printed twenty-four thousand copies, in those inys a prodigious number, of the "Coloquia Enasma," a book which was prohibited by the Faculty of Theology, and which the University orbade to be read or taught in its colleges.

NEW TYPE. RELIGIOUS TROUBLES.

In the following year, when it is estimated that there were in Paris about twenty-four printers, Francis I forbade the printing or pub-ishing of any book which had not received the sanction of the University and the Faculty of Theology, and had not been submitted for the pprobation of the Provost of Paris. In 1522 Robert Estienne published a Latin translation of the New Testament, which gave great offense to the Sorbonne, and although he obtained the yoyal license for a subsequent edition of the Bible in the same language, he was at length mpelled to submit to the authority of that iniliuition, and engage to print nothing for the nture unless cum bona coram gratia. By this means he was enabled to continue in the exercise of his occupation, and Sauval, in his

AUCTION SALES.

"Antiquities of Paris," says that in 1650 his sign of the olive tree was yet to be seen in the Rue fean de Beauvals. In 1533 the Sorbonne peti-ioned Francis I, then at Lyons, to abolish rinting altogether, and had it not been for the renuous opposition of Du Bellag, Archbishop Paris, and Guillaume Bede, they would cerinly have obtained their end.

## RESTRICTIONS.

In the following year Francis I issued letters itent which entirely prohibited printing, and signed the punishment of hanging (peine de la br) to printers, which was, however, refused e consent of Parliament. A month afterwards, e same King, who has been called the Father Restorer of Letters, ordered the Parliament proceed to the election of twenty-four peras, of whom he himself should choose twelve, ho, having given due security, should alone be lowed to exercise the art of printing in Paris, nd should be confined themselves, at the same me, to the production of "books approved and ecessary for the public weltare," under pain of

rbitrary punishment. By way of compensation in some sort, Francis subsequently exempted printers from service in the "Gardes Bourgoise," a policy which was dopted by his successor, Henry II, who had reviously revived the prohibition on all print-ng except such as had received the sanction of he University. Latterly, however, he showed himself to be more benevolently disposed to printers, and relieved them of the oppressive inties to which their work had hitherto been subjected; and in 1556 he ordered that a copy printed on vellum of every book published under authority should be sent to the Royal Library. These copies were beautifully bound, and it is said that the ordinance under which they were collected was issued on the petition of the celebrated Diane de Poitiers, whose armorial bearings may be found emblazoned on a great many books of this period.

## BETTER DAYS.

Charles IX followed in the steps of his prede cessors. Printing was encouraged by a very favorable decree, while on the other hand one Martin l'Homme, who had published a satire against the Guises, was hung. In spite of all restrictions, the art continued to prosper, and although the faculty of Medicine and the University had lost nothing of their ancient intolerance, under Louis XIII a regular censorship was established, and from the year 1627 printing was freed from all religions surveillance, and was merely subjected to a system of trade rules, of which D'Aguesseau made a careful digest in the Order of Council of the 20th February, 1723. During the sevenicenth and eighteenth cen-turies Holland and Switzerland afforded a re-

fuge to those authors who for political reasonable had cause to fear the laws of their own county, and when the stormy days of the Resolution were over the press found itself in possession of unfettered liberty, which, however, was some-what curtailed under the Consulate, and still further abridged under the Empire. The dis-tinction between journals and pamphlets, and works of greater extent, was first made after the Restoration, and although the Republic removed every restriction, under the second Empire a decree was issued which put the press under a regime which it had not known for some considerable time, and which, according to late official announcements, it is expected will be considerably modified.

## THE IMPEBIAL PRINTING OFFICE.

It was under Francis I that a royal printer of It was under Francis I that a royal printer of Greek was first appointed in the person of Con-rad Neobas, who was succeeded by Robert Esti-enne. In those times there was, however, no royal press, and the above-mentioned printers executed their work with their own type in their own workshops. Louis XIII caused an atelier for printing to be set up in the Louvre, under the name of L'Imprimerie Boyale, and the new establishment was greatly improved under Louis XIV, and a type foundry was added to it by Louis XV. The name has been changed several times. According to the will of existing governments,
