CAMDEN AFFAIRS.

ATTACK TOTAL

STOLE A POCKET-DOOK .- Yesterday a man named Smith visited a rescaurant on Fourth hand smith visited a rescarrant on Fourier strict, above Bridge avenue, kept by Heary Garren, for the purpose of getting a glass of ale. He received it. To pay the small amount he took from his pocket his pocket book, contain-ing \$45070, and had it on the conter. Receiving his chance be departed, forgetting that he had tert his money-holder. As he was

making his way from the satoon into the street, two men entered and called for ale. Mr. Smith had proceeded two squares from the tavern when he discovered us loss. He immediately repaired to Garren's; but the pocket book was gone. He called in an officer, and the two men and the proprietor were searched. Gatren was escarted before Mayor Cox, and the two men were called as witnesses. One of them, John Barnford, swore positively that he had not seen the book.

The evidence seemed to implicate the proprietor, and he was bound over in the sum of \$500 bail to answer. As Mr. Garren had always maintained a character for honesty, Officer Owens felt confident that he was not the thief, and commenced to work up the case. He and some others watched the two men closely. They saw them enter Garren's place again, and Barnford go out into the yard and take a seat on the porch.

A man was stationed at the alley fence, and saw Barnford reach up and take the pocket-book from the rafters of the shed. He reported it to Policeman Owens, who thereupon arrested him. As he was entering the Mayor's office heacknowledged that he had the money. After a hearing he was held in \$1000 bail to appear at Court.

A Row on THE FOURTH .- At a place called Star's Grove, at the junction of Broadway and Kaighn's Point avenue, the colored people of the vicinity held a pic-nic on the Fourth of July, Everything passed off pleasantly during the morning and early part of the afternoon. About 6 o'clock some white roughs originated a dis-turbance by annoying some of the colored people. The light soon became general, and legs, noses, and heads suffered considerably. John Kellev (white) received a dangerous wound in the back from a razor. No arrests were made.

A WOMAN BRATEN .- Last evening Officer

Owen found a woman lying on the ground near Scull's Spice Mills, drank. In close proximity to her was a man, who had hold of her arm. They were taken to the Station House, when it was discovered that the woman had been badly beaten, and it is leared that her jaw is broken. The man stated that he was holding her to prevent her from jumping overboard, When we consider that the parties were over two squares from the river Delaware, the story appears to be fabulous. They were locked up for a hearing.

A DISPUTE AND THE RESULT .- Yesterday a colored man named John Hazlet struck a mulatto woman, in consequence of a dispute they had had in reference to riding in the cars at Diamond Cottage. He was arrested, and while being taken to the Mayor's office attempted to pull something out of his pocket. Officer Owen grabbed his hand and pulled it out of his pocket suddenly, and with it came a razor. John was held to answer.

WOMAN ASSAULTED .- A woman named Rebecca Gibbs was struck by a shovel in the hands of a young man named William Graham Quig-ler. He was arrested and bound over. He had Rebecca bound over also, he alleging that she struck him with a brick previous to his administering the blow,

THE OVENS CASE.—The Special Committee appointed by Common Council to inquire and investigate whether William J. Ovens, one of the assessors of the Seventh Ward, has not been guilty of a gross violation of the duties of his office, and whether the requirements of the law

and ordinances governing the assessors have not been violated and disregarded by that officer, and whether his official conduct on the occasion of the late brutal murder of Colonel Riddle has not been such as to warrant an im-peachment by these Councils, and if the Com-mittee deemed the evidence sufficient, they were instructed to report articles of impeachment to the chamber, met last evening in the Select

Council chamber, Messrs. Evans, Harper, Shoemaker, Littleton, and Heizell, the Committee, were present.

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Messrs, John Riddle, Henry Hubn, and several other witnesses were examined. The testimony was similar to that adduced before Coroner Daniels and Alderman Beitler. The case was not finished, and the Committee adjourned to meet this afternoon.

ACCIDENTS.—William Alcorn, aged thirty-one, residing in Filbert street, above Twen-tieth, a member of the Good-Will Steam Fire Company, fell off a ladder while engaged at the fire at Broad and Race streets, breaking his arm and injuring himself severely about the head. He was taken to the Pennsylvania Hospital.

John W. Shultz, aged twenty-seven years, living at Eighteenth and Market streets, was struck on the head with a brick and badly injured on Thursday. He was conveyed to the Pennsylvania Hospital.

Artoine Leffer, a member of the Hand-in-Hand Steam Engine Company, was badly injured on the Fourth by the apparatus running against him and knocking him down. He was removed to his home, where his injuries were attended to.

At the same time Edward Buckley, the engineer, and J. D. Cuip, a member, were also severely injured.

NARROW ESCAPE.—Among the many narrow escapes from fire on the Fourth of July, was that of the dwelling of Dr. W. J. A. Birkey, No. 242 South Eighth street. A sky rocket, the shalt of which was six feet in length, entered the house through the third-story front window, and set fire to the bedding; fortunately it was extinguished before much damage had been done. The velocity of the rocket was so great that the shaft was broken by the force of striking.



THE NEW OXFORD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH .-The corner-stone of the Oxford Presbyte-rian Church edifice will be laid, with appropriate ceremonies, on Monday, the 8th day of July, 1867, at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

The external dimensions of the building will be 85 feet front on Broad street, by 120 feet on Oxford street. Height of the centre gable, 85 feet; height of tower and spire, 170 feet to the top of the ball.

The nave, or andience room, will be 65 feet wide, 50 feet high to the centre of the arched ceiling; 85 feet long from the vestibule to the pulpit; and with the organ gallery, it is calculated to comfortably sent one thousand persons; the organ callery to be 14 feet above the main floor, and the organ loft 36 feet high. The materials adopted are the Trenton brown-stone for the ruoble walls of the flanks and rear, having the description of the flanks and rear,

stone for the rubble wans of the names and rear, having the dressings, buttress caps, copings, moulded work, etc., all executed in Connecti-cut brown-stone, except the Broad street en-trances and window dressings, which will be

rubbed drab-stone. The estimated cost of the edifice is \$92,000. It is to be under roof before winter sets in, and is expected to be ready for occupancy in about eighteev months.

A brown stone chapel, 40 feet front on Oxford street, by 80 feet deep, has already been erected, at a cost of \$20,000, and is in use for public wor-ship and the Sabosth School.

The lot is 99 feet front on Broad street, a extends along Oxford street 237 icet to Par avenue, on which latter street it also has frontage of 99 feet; leaving an unoccupied spa on Oxiord street and Park avenue of 77 by feet, on which it is proposed to erect, at an car day, a separate Sabbath School building.




