On the 10th instant we gave a brief report of the examination of James Graham and Philip B. Lansing before Justice Burt, on the charge of swindling the Railway Passenger and Travellers' Assurance Company, of Hartford, out of 1000. Yesterday afternoon the Hou. L. C. Peck, of Nunda, was arraigned before Justice Vanderpoel, charged with complicity in the affair, and from his high standing in society, a new interest is given to the matter. Mr. Peck was a member of Congress for eight years, and has occupied the position of Judge of the Supreme and County Courts in his own district. He is now about seventy years of age. He was an intimate friend of the Hon. Miliard Fillimore, ex-President of the United States, and that gentiems occupied a seat by his side during the examination at the Police Court yesterday afternoon. District Attorney Bass yesterday afternoon. District Attorney Bass papeared for the people and A. P. Laning, Eso Suppeared for the people and A. P. Laning, Con Nunda, was the only witness put apon the stand. The case was finally adjourned till Tuesday next.

Perhaps, as the case is likely to occupy the attention of our Courts for some time, it would not be uninteresting to give what lew of the alleged facts our reporters have been able to obtain in relation to the affair.

It seems that Dr. Charles F. Warner and Thomas C. Hunt, both of Nunda, Livingston county, started last November to go West for the purpose of locating some land. On the 13th day of the month they arrived at Buffalo, and after taking a view of the city they bought tickets of James Graham, at his office on Exchange street, nearly opposite the Central Depot. While in the office there was some conversation about accident assurance tickets, Graham trying to induce them to purchase some, but they decilied. They then started for the West over the Lake Shore Railroad, but an accident occurred a short distance from Erie, and Hunt was killed. It is said that a few moments before the accident occurred one of the agents of the Company was passing through the car, and spoke to Warner and Hunt, who were cating some refreshmants, asking if they did not wish to be insured, when one of them remarked, "No, we will trust to our lunch basket." The next day Dr. Warner returned with the corpse to Buffalo, and while waiting for the train to goout, he met Graham and Lansing in the depot, when, it is charged, the plan was concocted to issue tickets of insurance on the life of Hunt, dailog them on the lish; that the scheme was carried out, and Dr. Warner returned to Nunda with the dead body. It is charges that Lausing informed Mrs. Hunt and her counsel, the Hon L. C. Peck, that these tickets were not genuine, but represented that it would be for the benefit of the Assurance these tickets were not genuine, but represented that it would be for the benefit of the Assurance Company to pay up the policy, and that they consented to the arrangement with the understanding that Graham, Lansing, and Warner were to have one thousand dollars each, and the widow three thousand.

The plan, it appears, did not work very well, for a gentleman named L. B. Warner was appointed administrator of the estate, and received the sum of \$6000 from the Company, but when the alleged conspirators claimed their share, the administrator declined to disburse any of the funds, on the ground that the whole acheme was simply a plot on their part to defraud the widow out of a portion of her just

defraud the widow out of a portion of her just dues.

There were frequent meetings between the parties, but the administrator remained firm, and by some means the state of affairs came to the knowledge of the detective of the Company. On the second day of July, 1857, the detective applied to Superintendent Reynolds, of the Nisgara Frontier Police, saying he had reason to suppose that a fraud had been perpetrated on the Company in this city, and asked the assistance of an officer to aid him in apprehending the suspected parties. Detective Walter Smith was detailed to act in conjunction with the Company's detective. Graham was immediately arrested and placed in confinement. Smith then started for Nunda, but discovered Dr. Warner on the cars at Utica, and returned with him as a prisoner. The Doctor made an open confession, implicating several other persons, after which he was released on bail.

A tug was brought into service and took them to Belle Isle, below the St. Clair Flats, where Lansing was found dealing out lager beer. He was brought to this city. Detective Smith arrested Mr. Peck, on the 12th instant, at Nunda. Last week he was brought before Justice Vanderpoel and committed to the custody of his counsel. Mr. Asgoodby, the Company's counsel at Nunda, was in Court yesterday watching the progress of the examination. Lansing and Graham are both at large on bail of \$3000.—Buffalo Express, 19th.

AFFAIRS IN RICHMOND.

RICHMOND, July 19.—Registration will be completed throughout the State before the time to which it was limited, the 1st of August, by General Schofield. Railways and Telegraphs in India. Before the Sepoy mutiny in India, the gross expenditure on public works in that country by the British Government averaged \$12,000,000 annually. But the financial years 1858-9 were seriously affected by the revolt of the native troops. The disbursement for the former year was only \$5,500,000, and for the latter \$2,000,000. In 1860 the imperial Government, on the abroga bion of the powers of the East India Company, had the entire administration of the oriental cominion in its hands, and the "authorized expenditure" of that year for public works was

Fourteen years ago the first railroad was opened in India; it ran from Bombay to Tannah. In 1854, in the presidency of Bombay 35 miles were in use, and in the following year 121 miles were opened in Bengal; in 1857 Madras had 88 miles in operation. This, with addi-tional mileage which had in the meanwhile been opened in the other presidencies, brought the total up to 274 miles. By the end of 1858 India possessed 332 working miles of permanent way. In seven years this mileage had increased more than eight-fold. At midsummer, 1865, it had stretched out to 2747 miles, divided among the different presidencies and provinces as fol-
