-Sir Moses Monteflore having received most heartrending accounts of the sufferings of his co-religionists in Moldavia, has determined, notwithstanding his great age, to proceed from England on a charitable mission to Jassy, to exercise his influence on behalf of the suf-

- General Heintzelman, heretofore connected with the Fifth Military District, and stationed in Texas, has been ordered by the War Department, at the expiration of his present leave of absence, to report in New York, and await further orders.

-Considerable interest has been excited in Bengal by the death of the Hon. Sumlonath Pundit, the only native yet found worthy of a seat on the bench of an Indian High Court. The deceased judge was of Cashmere origin; his family never intermarried with Bengalees, and he kept aloof from all Bengalee usages. He began life on £24 a year as a clerk, and then went to the native bar.

-During the centenary, Francis, the ex-King of Naples, held quite a Royal Court in Rome. He kept open house, and received four thousand visitors attached to the old régime. It is said that a large number of brigands took part in the celebration, and it was remarked that for a few days brigandage almost entirely ceased.

—A noble inventor has just appeared in the person of the Earl of Caithness. His lordship has made and patented a compass, which is said to be a great improvement on those now in use. The inventor claims for it a superiority to most of the influences by which compasses are liable to be vitiated. It has been tested on the Clyde, and seems to have given great satisfaction.

-The Sultan's visit to Lady Palmerston was paid by his Majesty at his own special desire, and was the only private visit he paid in England. The Sultan said that Lord Palmerston was the Englishman he had most desired to see, and that, as he had been removed by inexorable fate, it was his (the Sultan's) wish to pay homage to his name by visiting her ladyship.

-When Victor Hugo's comedy, the Burgraves, was produced with very qualified success, a reaction in favor of the classic, as opposed to the romantic school of dramas having set in, he had in his portfolio a new drama almost finished, entitled Les Deux Jumeaux. This work, already received at the Comédie, Victor Hugo threw aside in disgust, and it has remained to this day incomplete. It is hoped it will now be given to the world. It turns upon the adventures of the Man in the Iron Mask. M. Hugo has adopted the view, which M. Alexandre Dumas subsequently worked ont very ingeniously in his Vicomte de Bragelonne, that the man in question was a brother

of Louis XIV. -The female Australian black swan in the Zoological Gardens, of Lyons, France, a short time since laid two eggs, and as she did not seem anxious to sit upon them, they were placed among six others produced by a white swan. All eight birds were hatched, and all were of the same greyish hue. But the male and female old birds instinctively discovered the intruders, and maltreated them so much that one died, the other being rescued with some difficulty. It is at present thriving, and the black plumes which distinguish its race are beginning to appear.

-The Tribunal of Police of the Canton of Vaud, in Switzerland, has lately been engaged in trying a young man named Piquilloud, charged with having for some time past practised medicine and surgery in female attire. It appeared that he had succeeded in completely disguising himself as a woman, and had obtained, under the name of Miss Abbots, and in the quality of an American, admission into several families, offering his services chiefly to ladies. The fraud was detected by a hair-dresser, to whose shop he went to purchase a chignon. It was found that he could only be convicted of the illegal exercise of his profession, and on that count the Court con-

A Surgical Operation in the Days of the Incas.

The British Medical Journal says:-"M. Broca has presented to the Academy a most remarkable anatomical preparation. It is a skull found in the tomb of the Incas four miles from the city of Cuzco. M. Broca believes that the skull belonged to an individual who underwent at the same time a fracture and a denudation of the frontal bone. The curious part of it is that the bone shows traces of having undergone the operation of trephining. A circular white spot is visible, which shows necrosis of a portion of the bone; and all around it the rarefied tissue has evidently been the seat of an osteltis, the commencement of eliminative action. M. Nélaton has examined the preparation, and calculates that the patient survived the operation about fifteen days. The opening is of a lozenge shape, and about twelve millimetres in diameter. M. Broca thinks that the operation was performed with a gouge."

SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH .- The Scientific Association of France promises to effect more for scientific purposes than any other continental Already it has expended 78,000 francs in scientific investigations and experiments. Its Bulletin in future is to be a weekly instead of a monthly publication.

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
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
