ROBBERY AT BORDENTOWN.

[ EVENING TELEGRAPH SPECIAL CORRESPONDENCE. ] Bordentown, N. J., August 13. The quiet city of Bordentown, N. J., was thrown into a state of excitement yesterday afternoon by the discovery of a most diabolical

attempt at robbery. From what we could learn from those congregated around the cell in which the participants in the act were incarcerated. we note these particulars, which, though they may be somewhat colored by the excitement of the moment, are substantially correct.

It appears that two men-father and sonentered the bouse of a Mrs. Cassidy and offered for sale a portion of bogus jewelry, with which they were abundantly supplied. While Mrs. Cassidy was preparing to settle for the articles she sidy was preparing to settle for the articles she had selected, the villains wized her and gagged her, forcing a spool of cotton in her throat, which not only effectually prevented any outery, but caused her considerable pain. They then secured the money in her possession, and left the house. The husband of Mrs. Cassidy was absent at the time, but providentially soon had occasion to call at his home, where he was surpresed to see his wife suffering great agony, and prised to see his wife suffering great agony, and secured beyond the possibility of releasing hereelf. He at once rendered her assistance, and then started in pursuit of the scoundrels. He summoned the aid of the authorities, and in a short time realized the satisfaction of witnessing the arrest of the party, who were at the time engaged in dividing the spoils. No doubt is expressed as to their identity; and as New Jersey laws are executed to the letter, the result of the afternoon's work will confirm the truth that "the way of the transgressor is hard."

JAPANESE IN A POLICE COURT.

Their Troubles Settled-A New Story-Foo-choo-matz Discharged.

At the police headquarters yesterday, charges were made against some of the Japanese troupe, jugglers, and acrobats for embezzling the sum of \$3500 in gold. Three of the troupe were brought before Inspector Leonard. Among them was little "All Right," who seemed to comprehend fully the situation of affairs, wept bitterly, and would not be comforted, notwithstanding the efforts of Mr. Leonard, through the interpreter, Sumprell, to explain that no harm would be done to any of his friends.

The whole affair was somewhat confused; but The whole affair was somewhat confused; but

in order to bring the ease up for investigation, a warrant was issued and Foo-choo-matz was placed in confinement to appear on examination at the Tombs Police Court this morning on

the charge of larceny.
This morning Foo-choo-matz was brought into court, looking very much dejected, having passed a sleepless night, and maintaining that he was the object of a swindle. He was accompanied by his nephew, the great involte of the people, Ring-kee-chee, or little "Ail Right." Among the witnesses on the part of Foo-cheematz were Zoo-shee-kee, Ohee-shau-kee, La-as-kee, Ohee zah-shau. Af-noo-schee, Foo-choo-chee, I-ask-chee, and Zang-kee-chee, with Mr. Smith. Mr. W. C. Traphagen appeared as counsel for Foo-chee matz.

The real facts of the case show that the Japapese were misrepresented. Mr. Smith stated to Judge Hogan that while in Japan last year, he (Smith) made a contract with the Japanese Government to take Foo-choo-matz, and several other Japanese performers on a tour through the States, leaving Japan October 16, and to return one year from that time—October 16, 1867. Smith also said he had adopted Ring-kee-chee, or "All Right," an intelligent little fellow, nine years of age, by permission of the Japanese Government. He arrived at San Francisco, a short time after the contract, per-formed there awhile with "All Right" and the prisoner. Foo-choo-matz, who was his chosen ader and most skilful performer, then came to New York, thence through the Northern States, and finally to Buffalo, which he left on Friday last, and came to Jersey City on Saturday even-ing. He sold out his interest in Foo-choo-matz and All Right, his best performers, until August 28, to Mr. Maguire, for the sum of fifteen thoucand dollars, but limited the time of their engagement, as he had stipulated with the Japa-nese Government to return them by October 16, and he wished to stop their performing, and put them under the tuition of a good English teacher for a month, as they were learning our language rapidly, particularly httle "All Right," who already can understand almost everything

Maguire, " is said, obtained the signature of Foo-cnoo matz for an engagement until February next, instead of August 20th, for \$3500. When the information came to Foo-choo-matz, he said he had only made arrangements until August 20th, and wished to return to Japan with Mr. Smith. Maguire then made the complaint of embezzlement against the Japanese for the recovery of the sum paid.

With this explanation, as no evidence was produced to conflict with it, Judge Hogan discharged the prisoner. This announcement was received with much satisfaction by Foo-choo-matz; and little "All Right" was very enthusiastic at the result, and wished to communicate it as soon as possible to Mrs. Smith, The Japanese company appear intelligent,

and Mr. Smith says that in passing through this country they have observed everything con-nected with our social life, and are rapidly adopting our customs. They take a great interest in our civil government, and are anxious to become acquainted with our system of gov-ernment. They can all write in their own language, and freely give their autographs to any person desiring them.

Lattle "All Right" is no less remarkable for his activity of mind and general intelligence than for his acrobatic performances, and his guardian will endeavor to obtain the permission of the Sovereign of Japan to have the little fellow educated in this country .- N. Y. Evening Post, 12th.

Sensation Among the Chicago Grain Operators. From the Chicago Post, Saturday.

Had a bombshell fallen in among the operators on Change this forenoon, no greater consterna-tion could have been created than ensued from the arrest of eight prominent members, including one of the Vice-Presidents, upon the charge of gambling. Business was suspended, and buying and selling aitogether ceased. It was at once understood that the species of legitimatized gambling known as "selling short" had the treat its deserts and come to grief. To the at last met its deserts and come to grief. To the uninitiated it will be interesting to know what is meant by the term "selling short." practice among a certain class of operators in grain to effect a sale of wheat, or corn, or so forth, for future delivery, when in reality the seller does not own a bushel of grain.

One D. A. Goodrich has been victimized by this "selling short" business to an aggravating extent, and forth with set about maturing a plan of vengeance. By consulting the statutes of Illinois it became evident that the selling of that which is not owned is included among the various phases of gambling. By a careful reading of the Warehouse bill, passed last winter, it was found that "short selling" was one of the practices particularly forbidden. Accordingly foodsteh made complaint and procured was Goodrich made complaint and procured war-rants for the arrest of eight operators, viz.;—B. P. Hutchinson, D. C. Scranton, J. J. Richards, Charles Pope, William Shiek, A. Iechold, Howard Priestly, and George J. Brine, These were ar-rested this forenoon at 11 o'clock, in the Cham-ber of Commerce, by the Sheriff of Cook county. They were taken before a Justice of the Peace, where they waived an examination, and gave where they waived an examination, and gave

bail in the sum of \$3000 each for their appearance before the Recorder in September.

After an absence from Change of about an hour, the members returned. The excitement meanwhile had subsided, it having been gene-rally concluded that the law would fall to reach the case in point—a view in which the liberated gamblers evidently joined, for they improved the lost time by buying and selling short as

vigorously as possible.

General Grant in His New Position. General Grant was at the War Deppartment yesterday, clo eted with Secretary Stanton up to 3 P. M., and this morning he formally entered upon the discharge of his duties as Secretary of War ad interim. Mr. Stanton was at the War Department to-day for some hours, engaged in turning over the books and papers to General Grant. The Headquarters of the Army will remain, as heretofore, in the building at the corner of Seventeenth and H streets, where the staff officers of General Grant will discharge their duties.

General Grant will have his office in the War Department building, and will discharge his duties as General in-Chief through Major Leet, Assistant Adjutant-General, while his duties at the War Department will be discharged through Adjutant-General Townsend. No change will be made in the officers of the War Department. General Grant attended the Cabinet meeting today in his new capacity of Secretary of War.

Postal Affairs. Postmaster-General Randall has directed the Postmaster at San Francisco to make up and forward the mails from San Francisco to Sitka, Russian America, at the rate of fifty dollars per round trip, the service not to exceed once a month. This order will remain in effect until the meeting of Congress, when a regular postal route will be established between the above named places.

The Reported Robbery of the United States Treasury.

New York, August 13 .- The reported robbery of the United States Treasury emanates from a new paper, issued to-day by Edward E. Dunbar, who was for a long time intimate and confiden, tial in the Treasury Printing Department, and who was President of the International Bank Note Company.

The paper contains a long article on the subject, embracing these points:-Criminal and reckless mismanagement; enormous deficiencies; frauds; duplicate issues; hundreds of millions involved; redemption of duplicate coupons, notes, and currency; wanton expenditure, general confusion of accounts; the Government ignorant of the amount of Government paper obligations afloat, etc. etc.
