N. Y., was held at the Perseverance Hose house last evening. The members of the Eagle are principally merchants, and they will have one of the grandest welcomes extended to them that has ever been witnessed in this city, which has excelled all others in courtesies to visiting fremen.

The visitors will be the guests of the Perseverance Hose Company, who have provided the most ample accommodations for them at the Washington House.

The meeting was organized by the election of John G. Butler, of the Perseverance Hose, as President, and W. D. Kendrick, of the Columbia

Engine, as Secretary.

Mr. W. L. Forman, of the Weccacoe Engine Company, offered a resolution forbidding any burlesque apparatus being drawn in the line of procession. He said such things have had their day, and if continued they might lead to serious consequences, as those who went with them stretched their play until it became offensive to many persons.

The resolution was unanimously adopted. There being no business ready, the Convention adjourned for one week, when the arrange ments will be perfected.

ENCOUNTER WITH A BURGLAR .- On Tuesday evening about 11 o'clock, the private watchman of Curwen Stoddart & Co., Nos. 450, 452, and 454 North Second street, noticed three suspicious looking fellows loading around the neighbor-hood, gazing at the stores, apparently with no especial business. He kept his eyes open for them, and about 3 o'clock yesterday morning he raw them climbing over the fence on Steamer alley, on which a restaurant backs, and which is parallel with St. John's street. The restaurant has been occupied by Nathan Coombes, and is numbered 432 on North Second street. They had entered the place probably by means of ulppers, as no marks are observable upon the rear door. He quickly found another pri-vate watchman, told him of what was going on, and left him to watch the place while he went to the Police Station on Third street (the Seventh District) for a patrolman or two, as none could be found on the street roundabout. The man was a bungler, however, and made such a terrible noise and hullaballoo in trying to get out of a gate that the burglars heard the racket and skedaddled, leaving in the yard in the rear of the restaurant their boots and a set of burglar's tools. Coombes had just sold out, and it is believed that the burglars imagined there was considerable money in the house, which would repay them for their trouble and risk. As it is, they got nothing-rather they

DISTILLERY TROUBLES .- John W. Barnes, Revenue Inspector in the Fifth District, accompanied by several assistants and two officers, visited two distilleries on Tuesday, in Salmon street, above William, that were illegally in operation, no licenses having been obtained. The malt and mash in both places, contained in twenty-one hogsheads, were destroyed, and the still and other machinery placed in a wagon for removal. The inspector then visited a distillery at the corner of Ann and William streets for the purpose of destroying it, but he was resisted by parties inside, who retused to open the doors. While Mr. Barnes was attempting to force an entrance, a crowd of several hundred persons assembled in the street, and while some threw stones at the Inspector and his assistants, others took possession of the wagen and threw the stills and other machinery taken from the other distilleries in the street. Mr. Barnes, finding it impossible to make any headway against so many who were opposed to him, and having been hit several times with bricks, jumped into his wagon and made his escape.

New Station Houses .- Yesterd ay afternoon the Committee on Police convened for the purpose of taking further action in relation to the new station house now being erected in the Seventeenth Police District. The district comprises that part of the city lying south of South street, and from Sixth to Broad streets, and the new station house is being erected on Taylor street (running south of Dickerson street), west of Ninth. The building will be some 22 by 80 teet in dimensions, and will cost \$9000. The first story has been completed by the tractor, and in a short time it will be ready for occupancy.

A new station house is now being built for the Seventh District, including the Eleventh and Tweifth Wards. It will be of more extended dimensions than the one now in the other district, and will cost over \$10,000. It will be lo cated on St. John street, below Green, in the rear of the old Northern Liberty Hall, and promises to prove a serviceable and substantial building.

A MEMORIAL TABLET .- The members of the Perseverance Hose Company have a tablet in their house bearing the following inscription:
"Tribute of respect to our late fellow-members and Charles H. Hines, who lost their lives at the fire in Bread street by the fall-ing of the walls of the sugar-house and brewery on the night of the 21st of August, 1847."

Andrew Butler was for thirty-five years an active and efficient member of the Company, and at the time of his death was Secretary and Treasurer of the Fire Association, which place he filled for ten years with much credit to himself and advantage to the department. He, Hines, who fell by his side, died beloved and respected by all who knew him.

Beneath this, encased in a black frame, is a finely-executed likeness of the lamented President Lincoln, who was elected an honorary member of the Company, and, on being pre-sented with a certificate of his election, gratefully acknowledged the compliment.

MEETING OF THE LEAGUE ISLAND JOINT COMMIT-THE OF COUNCILS .- The Joint Committee of Councils, to which was entrusted the adoption of such measures as might be necessary to secure the ground on the northern shore of the back channel, fronting League Island, for presentation to the United States as a site for a nav yard, held a meeting yesterday, and considered the communications of the owners of the land. All but one asks \$1000 an acre-the single on asking \$1500. Accompanying this statement of price by the \$1000 owners was a request that the city grade and pave the streets on their pro perty, make tootways, and hereafter attend to the drainage. Their price, they state, was fixed at \$1000 in consideration of these favors. The Committee looked upon these prices as exorbi tant, and have requested the Court of Quarter Sessions to appoint a jury of award.

PEACHES BY RAILBOAD .- From eighty to one hundred car loads of peaches pass over the Philadelphis, Wilmington, and Baltimore Railroad every evening, having been loaded along the line of the Deinware Railroad. Each car holds 800 baskets or 400 boxes, thus making an average of 64,000 baskets daily which reach New York and this city by this route alone. On Monday evening 110 cars, in three trains, passed over the road, 80 of which went direct to New York.

SHOCKING ACCIDENT .- A child named James Gallagher, aged sixteen months, residing at Twenty-seventh and Lombard streets, was run over yesterday by a cart and killed. The Coroner will examine into the case this morning. The driver, John Reardon, was arrested, and held to

THE INERTIA POSE TRIAL -A trial of the Inertia Fuse, for special projectiles, at Fort Millin, took place in the presence of a number of persons yesterday atternoon. The fitteen-inch smooth-bore Rodman gun was used, and three spherical shells, weighing 335 pounds each, were fred. All the shells ricocheted across the river and exploded on striking the earth on the New Jersey shore. The results demonstrated that the Inertia Fuse can be used in recochet firing with perfect success. The fuse had been previously tested in the light twelve-pound guis, and gave equal satisfaction in that and other calibres less than fifteen inch. The fuse is the investion of Major W. S. Backe, United States invention of Major W. S. Beebe, United States Ordnance Corps.

RECEPTION OF RT. REV. BISBOP WOOD.—
This distinguished prelate is expected to return to this city about September 15. The sugsestion made by the Catholic Philopatrian Literary Institute, that a reception be tendered to the Bishop, has been adonted by the Cathotic societies of this city. A meeting of about thirty conferences of St. Vincent de Paul, benedicial and literary societies, was held at the hall of the Particular Council of St. Vincent de Paul last evening. Hon. Joseph R. Chandler presided. Very Rev. Dr. O'Hara, administrator of the diocese, and other clergy were present. It was resolved that the reception take place on the grounds of St. John's Asylum, on the arrival of the Bishop.

FIRE AT A FOUNDRY .- Shortly after 7 o'clock last evening a fire was occasioned in the scale manufactory of Messrs. Burke, Dinmore & Co., situated at Ninth and Meion streets, in consequence of material around the turnaces taking fire. The loss is estimated at \$400.


