WANTED IN LOUISIANA .- A warrant of arrest, WARTED IN LOUISIANA.—A warrant of arrest, issued by his Excellency Governor John W. Geary, upon a requisition from his Excellency J. Madison Wells, Governor of Louisiana, was yesterday placed in the hands of Detective Joshua Taggart. The warrant directed the arrest of F. Lay Norton, who is charged with obtaining goods by false pretense in the State of Louisiana. Louisiana. Detective Taggart was not ac-quainted with Mr. Norton, but called at a store for the purpose of obtaining some information concerning him, and was so fortunate as to find the gentleman there. He was locked up at the Central Station, and in the atternoon his friends obtained a writ of habeas corpus from Judge Ludlow, which is returnable on the 31st instant. Mr. Norton has been committed to jail to await the hearing of the habeas corpus writ.

WHARF EXTENSION .- The Board of Port Wardens have authorized the extension of a wharf on the Delaware river, south of Laurel street, one hundred and nmety-three fest in length, by sixty-five feet in width, and the bulkhead eighty-two by sixty-four feet; and large iron-works, which will give employment to some three hundred men, will be erected thereon.

A new wharf, two hundred and thirty-four feet long, by sixty feet wide, will be built at Plum street, and the three new ones opposite Chester.

Nor SAFE .- In accordance with a request of the Board of Health, the Building Inspectors have made a survey of the foundation walls the Municipal Hospital. They report that the north and south walls of the west wing and part of other portions of the wall would have to come down. They also reported that the workmanship was very bad, the stones loose, and the mortar very poor. The building was erected about three years ago, under the superintendence of a board of commissioners, con-sisting of members of the Boards of Prison Inspectors, Guardians of the Poor and Health. The work of making the building safe has commenced.


