

CITY INTELLIGENCE.

MEETING OF SCHOOL CONTROLLERS.—The Controllers of the Public Schools held their regular stated meeting yesterday afternoon.

The attendance was full, President Shippen in the chair. The usual variety of communications was received from the various school districts.

The Eighth Section wants better school accommodations, for which the Directors make a united and earnest appeal.

The Thirteenth wants to put iron railing round the Wyoming school-house, and putting the yard in proper condition for the game of "tag."

The Twenty-fifth thinks the city would do well to buy the lot 100 feet by 225 in Richmond street, for school purposes.

A memorial was received from the Association of Friends, asking for more evening schools for the benefit of colored children, of whom there are 25,000 in the city.

Mr. Clark stated that he had advertised for applicants for teachers of colored youth, and that not a single reply had been received.

The above communications were referred. The Committee on Property made a report, with resolutions attached, that the premises of the Girard estate, in Spruce street, above Second street, be rented for one year, from August 15, 1867, at \$600 per annum, and that the room in the building be rented for one year at \$225 per annum.

Front premises corner of Frankford road and Beigrade street be rented, from May 1st, at \$100 per annum; also, premises Diamond and Thirteenth streets at the same rate.

That Councils be asked to appropriate \$1200 for repairs to school-houses in Cottage street, Twenty-second Ward.

That a warrant for \$4500 be drawn in favor of W. W. Smedley for the purchase of property at Whitehall.

The entire report was adopted. A debate now commenced as to the discrepancy in the valuation for the erection of the school-house at Sixth and Coates streets and the actual cost thus far assumed.

The subject ultimately was referred to the Committee on Property, with instructions to report within two months.

A resolution ordering the payment of salary to Misses Crawford and Walton, teachers of colored schools, was introduced.

It struck the keynote to a long debate, but the resolution finally passed.

A motion was made that the Secretary give all facts in the case of Misses A. Driggs, Crawford, and Walton. The yeas were 16; nays, 6. The resolution, therefore, was adopted.

No other business of public interest was transacted. Adjourned.

A boy named Vanmeter was seriously, if not fatally injured yesterday afternoon, by being run over by the cars at the Reading Railroad and Thompson street. He was taken to the Episcopal Hospital. He resided at Girard avenue and Orange street.

Yesterday, a lad named Samuel Williams, thirteen years old, had a thigh broken, while near Fifth and Walnut streets, by slipping on and falling upon one of the rails of the car track. He was playing with a ball at the time.
