Washington, Sept. 13—It is known that Major General Fitz John Porter's appeal to the President for a reconsideration of the court-martal's proceedings in his case, and the accompanying indersemente, found their way into print apart from any agency whatever of his own. As, however, publicity has been given to the papers, there is no impropriety in stating that the following memorial, addressed to President Lincoln, but hearing no date, is also before President Johnson:

Your memorialists respectfully represent that, by a court-martial convened at Washington, Major General Fitz John Porter was sentenced to be cashiered and rendered forever incapable of service under the government of the United States.

That such a sentence is to a gallant officer, in

vice under the government of the United States.

That such a sentence is to a gallant officer, in some respects, worse than a sentence of death, in-asmuch as it makes him the living and conspicuous victim of the terrible penalty.

That a few weeks only before the events which drew upon General Porter this severe sentence, he received the highest reward which the President can best w for skill and gallactry in one of the most important actions of the war.

Your memorialists are ndvised that, following the impulses of a controlling love of justice, your Excellency has, on many occasions during the war, reconsidered and revoked the sentences of courts martial in cases far less grave than the present, patiently employing your time, notwithpresent, patiently employing your time, notwith-standing the urgent demands upon it, in sifting and weighing the evidence, and listening to the explanations and defence of the accused.

And your memorialists, in consideration of the extreme severity of the sentence in the case of Major General Fitz John Porter, and of his preof peril and death, respectfully solicit you to reconsider the proceedings of the court-martial by
which he was condemned.

This course, they begienve to suggest, mus', in

whatever event, be satisfactory to your Excel-lency. Should the result be adverse to General Porter, it will strengthen you in the conviction that the original sentence was just. If favorable to the General, it will, your memorialists are con-fident, afford your generous nature the highest gratification of which it is capable of enjoying. (Signed.)

IMPROVING OUR PUBLIC SCHOOL BUILDINGS .-The Committee on Property of the Board of School Controllers held a meeting yesterday afternoon, for the consideration of application received at the last stated meeting of the Board from the Sectional Boards of the Fourth, Fifth and Eighth Wards, for the extension of better facilities to some of the schools in said sections. The applications are favorably considered, and will likely be recommended at the next stated meeting of the Board.

The church basement of primary school No. 1 in the Eighth Section, which is damp and badly lighted, is asked to be changed to a better and more suitable place, and from the Fourth Section, air-tight gas-consuming heaters are asked or the new school-house at Twelfth and Fitzwater streets.

The Board of Directors of the Thirteenth Section forwarded to the Controllers, at their last meeting, a lengthy communication, in which they state that the new school-house at the N. W. corner of Sixth and Coates street was originally estimated at a cost of \$52,375. The sum appropriated by [Councils was \$45,500, making a difference in cost of \$6875 more than the amount appropriated. Upon communication with the architect certain changes were agreed upon, which elicated a bid for \$44,375, an amount within the appropriation.
