GREAT MEETING AT FRANKFORD -SPEECHES OF CENERAL OWEN, HOY. JANES M. SCOVEL, HOS. WILLIAM B. MANN, A. W. It could not be ascertained at the time whether they had removed any of the property from the premises. From the disordered appearance of the shelves, it is believed that an extensive robbery was contemplated.

ROBBERY OF A BONDED WAREHOUSE .- At an early hour yesterday morning, the officer patrol-ling the beat on Penn street, below Shippen, discovered the doors of the new sugar bonded warehouse there situated, open, and on entering discovered the head of one of the hogsheads had been knocked out. An entrance had been effected by breaking the hasp attached to the lovernment lock. It is supposed the thieves had been frightened away, as but a small quantity of the contents of the hogshead had been removed.


