In plain nerversion of law, if not in open definite of law, we see the removal of the unfinching Minister of War, who has been a "cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night" through the long watch and agony of the Republic; we see the most brilliant soldier of his time deprived of his command and treated like a culpit, because he is ably and successfully executing the laws of he is ably and successfully executing the laws of the laud; we see others equally blameless griven from their posts of duty; we see recon-struction hindered and prevented, restoration and Union, battled, order destroyed and peace dissurbed by every makeshift and subterluge that stoister invention can desire; to cap the climax effusurpation and effrontery, a proclamation issues, giving obliven to treason in its rankest, guiltiest forms. This proclamation, without issues, giving oblives to recommation, without faw and against law, assumes to override the disabilities imposed by act of Congress not only, but which New York, and every other loyal state—unless Maryland, Kentucky, and Delaware be exceptions—have declared shall be imbedded in the bulwarks of the Constitution itself. What does all this mean? It means assuration as much as Louis of France meant usurpation as much as Louts of France meant usurpation-when he said, "The State—that is me." It means that the Executive grasp is clutching unlawful and dangerous forms; it means that the acting President of the United States, and those whose creature he is, are assuming forbidden prerogatives, mean ing to wield them not only to the public detriment, but for purposes armed against the security, if not against the existence of the Government. Do you ask me bow far they will go? I answer, as far as they dare. Do you ask how far they dare go? I answer, as far as the approaching elections shall be them dare. Do you ask for the remedy? It has, in the first instance, with the people at the polls, and atterwards, if need be, with the people in Congress assembled. I do not mean, as some have insisted, that Congress should remain in pernetual extraordinary session, and strain or transcend the Constitution by taking from him the Presidential powers vested by the Constitution in the Executive alone; nor do I mean that Congress should, by any legislative device, attempt to circumvent or supersede the chief Executive office. As well might a cour , because a Sheriff or Marshal was unfaithful, attempt to execute its process uself. The Constitution says the President, not Congres, shall see that the laws are faithfully executed. If the President cannot be trusted with the functions of office, it be has done acts which forfeit his right to exercise the powers of his place, if he is so intally bent on mischief that he is not fit to be left unwatched or unfied, the Constitution prescribes the remedy. It is not that Congress shall usurp or curtail the Executive office, nor that the two Houses shall crouch 1-dogs baying to prevent Executive action. No such contrivance finds place in the charter of our liberties. No extremity can ever justify it. Any condition of things demanoing such a resort will demand some-thing more. It is not for me to express nor even to form an opinion of the grounds of impeachment which may exist. The duty I may in another place be called upon to do imposes silence and abstinence upon me; and besides, from the out at it has been my carnest hope that the country might be spared the anxiety and disturbance incident to deposing the chief officer of the Government. But I may be permitted to say, that whenever the acting President cannot be restrained within loyal limits, except by being shorn of the constitutional powers of his office, and kept continually cowed by sessions of Congress avowedly maintained for that purpose, the welfare, the dig-nity the judgment, the conscience of the nation will Gemand higher and sterner methods. 1t. indeed, such a juncture shall ever arise. the grand inquest of the nation present the sc-cused for his crimes and misdemeanors; let him have an impartial trial, and it found guilty, let him be consigned by judicial sentence, as he will be, by the enlightened judgment of mankind, to an infamy as immortal as the cause be, has betrayed. But such a proceeding is a last resort. It anything can curb the President before it is too late, it is our success in the canvass now progressing. The public journals of our political opponents, feeling the odium of openly espousing the Executive, are nervously and boisterously disclaiming affiliation with him. but the strategem is too transparent, and it comes too late. The diminished Union vote in Maine and California, although wholly due to local and personal issues, is set down to Presidential popularity, and immense harm has already come from the encouragement thus derived. Should other states be equally needless of the general interests at stake, should the Union column faiter, every vote east against us will be counted an indorsement of the recent acts of Andrew Johnson, and will embodden him to yet other aggressions. The issue then is between distraction, commotion, and exhaustion on the one side, and on the other, union, tranquillity, and prosperity. The country wants repose, wants an end of reconstruction, not only tor the wants an end of reconstruction, not only for the take of reconstruction, but for the sake of the anterests which he behind; the states maiship of the nation is needed for other questions; the commercial and industrial affairs of the country, the interest of American labor, and especially she chances now becoming in scale quarters the the most careful and enlightened treatment.
