

BUILDINGS ON PRNN SQUARE.-Last evening a meeting of the Committee on Finance of Coun cils took place in the committee room. The matter of appropriating Penn Square for buildings for the various public matitutions came up. At the request of the committee, several gentle-At the request of the committee, several gentle-men, representing the Academy of Fine Arts, Natural Sciences, Philadelphia Library, Frank-lin Institute, Philosophical Society, and other institutions, appeared before them. Messrs, H. C. Lea and Eli K. Price gave their views to the committee in relation to the subject. They stated that the idea of the institution they represent is that the Mayor recommend the Legisla-ture to give Councils the power to permit these societies to erect baildings upon terms that Councils may deem equitable and jast. After listening to these statements, the Com-

mittee decided to introduce a resolution to Councils requesting the Major to prepare a bill to be presented to the Legistature, asking that body to give Councils the necessary power. The Committee do not propose that the sity should relinquish its littles to the squares, or to convey the ground in fee simple. It proposes to permit the societies merely to build there, that people from all sections of the city might have equally easy access to the premises, and structures might be crected of extent commen-surate with the importance of the societies owning them.

Mr. Lee stated that, in his opinion, as soon as the plans are agreed upon, liberal contributions would be made by our cilizens for their con-struction, and that he personally would give \$10,000 towards the object.
