NOTICE TO MARINERS.

The light station at Tybee Island, on the NE. end of the island, south side of entrance to Bavannah river, Ga., has been re-established, and the lights will be exhibited therefrom on the evening of Oct. 1, 1867.

The illuminating apparatus of the main light is a Frennel lens of she first order, showing a fixed white light.

The tocal plane is 150 feet above the level of the sca, and the light should be seen in clear weather a distance of twenty-two miles,
The tower is brick, octagonal in form, colored white, surmounted by a black lanters.

The ybbe Beacon light will be situated in front of the main light at a distance of 2000 feet and is designed as a range light in croasing the bar entrance to Savannah river.

The liuminating apparatus is a lens of the fourth order, showing a fixed white light.

The tower is wooden, coloied white, the lower part open frame, and the upper part closed, surmounted by a black lantern.
