

CHURCH COUNCIL AT LAMBETH.

The American Bishops—The Colenso Case. We are indebted to the editors of the Church Journal for the following detailed report of the proceedings of the Pan-anglican Synod at Lambeth—a courtesy all the more appreciated from the fact that the Council have shut out the newspaper reporters.

On Tuesday, the 14th of September, at the invitation of the Archbishop of Canterbury, a preliminary meeting of the Bishops of the Anglican Communion was held at the house of the S. P. G., No. 5 Park Place, St. James street. The Archbishop himself took the chair at noon, and some thirty or forty Bishops were present, about one-third of whom were American. Among these last were the Bishops of Vermont, Rhode Island, Arkansas, and the assistant Bishops of Ohio and Indiana. The meeting was altogether informal; none but Bishops were present; and no minutes were kept.

The chief discussion—the session lasting four hours in all—was in regard to opening the programme for the consideration of the Colenso case. The metropolitan of Cape Town made a long and very able speech in favor of this course, as due to the truth, which has been so greatly outraged by Dr. Colenso; but objections were made on the ground that every portion of the Anglican communion had already condemned and repudiated Colenso. Both houses of Convocation in England, the Church in Scotland, the provincial Synods in the colonies, and the general convention of our own church, had all spoken, and nearly all unanimously. Moreover, the Bishop of Lincoln had already recorded the deposition and excommunication of Colenso as perfectly valid and final.

The Proposed Visit of Charles Dickens. Boston, Oct. 2.—Charles Dickens has just telegraphed to his American publishers, Ticknor & Fields, of Boston, his decision to come to the United States, and give his readings in the principal cities. He will leave England, either in the Java, on October 26, or in the Scotia, on November 2, and will begin to read in the first week of December. The rumors of his health are all unfounded. He never was heartier in his life.

The Political Campaign in Ohio. CINCINNATI, Oct. 2.—The Congressional campaign in Ohio District has become very exciting. Though the radical majority last year was twenty-five hundred, it is admitted that the race between Smith and Carey will be very close. Over 20,000, mostly one thousand dollar bets, was to-day wagered even on the result.

Yellow Fever on the Dry Tortugas. Key West, Oct. 1, via Lake City Oct. 2.—Accounts from the Dry Tortugas report that Lieutenants Gordon and Zelinski were both very low with yellow fever, no hopes being entertained of their recovery.
