CHURCH COUNCIL AT LAMBETH. The American Bishops - The Colenso Case-The Ritualists, Etc.

We are indebted to the editors of the Journal for the following detailed report of the proceedings of the Pan anglican Synod at Lambeth—a courtesy all the more appreciated from the fact that the Council have shut out the newspaper reporters—

'On Tuesday, the 14th of September, at the invitation of the Archbishop of Canterbury, a 'preliminary meeting' of the Bishops of the Anglican Communion was held at the house of the S. P. G., No. 5 Park Place, St. James street.
The Archbishop himself took the chair at moon, and some thirty or jorty Bishops were noon, and some thirty or torty Bishops were noon, and some thirty or lorty Bishops were present, about one-third of whom were Americans. Among these last were the Bishops of Vermont, Illinois, North Carolina, New York, Louisiana, Rhode Island, Arkanens, and the assistant Bishops of Ohio and Indiana. The meeting was altogether informal; none but Bishops were present; and no minutes were bent.

"The chief discussion—the session lasting four hours in all—was in regard to opening the programme for the consideration of the Colenso case. The metropolitan of Cape Town made a long and very able speech in iavor of this course, as due to the Iruth, which has been so greatly outraged by Dr. Colenso; but objections was made on the ground that every portion of the Anglican communion had already condemned and repudiated Colenso. church, had all spoken, and nearly all unanimously. Moreover, bishop after bishop declared
that they recognized the deposition and excommunication of Colenso as perfectly valid spirit
ally. The Bishop of Lincoln, for instance,
said that it Colenso presented himself to receive
the holy communion, he (the Bishop of Lincoln)
would not minister it to him; nor would be admit him to a beneues in his discose, should any mit him to a benedice in his diocese, should anybody be so unwise as to present him to one.
Other English bishops said the same thing; and
not one isped a word to the contrary. The Bishop
of Haron stood up manfully for the Metropolitan of Cape Town—but thought the Ritualiets
should be dealt with likewise. The Bishop of
London, though thinking that the Ritualiets
were really doing more harm in the Church
(that is, we suppose, making more rapid progress) than the Colensoites, yet repudiated the
idea of the Council touching that subject, which
plainly belonged to each distinct Church to
settle for liself; and that branch of the subject
then fell dead. The Bishops of New York, Vermont, Illinois, and others of the American mit him to a beneuce in his diocese, should any mont, Illinois, and others of the American bishops were among the speakers, every one of them standing manually by the Bishop of Cape Town. The Metropolitans of Montreal and New Zealand did the same. Indeed, the perfect unanimity on the subject was a delight to all. The only difficulty was as to the legal validity of Colenso's excommunication, according to the laws of England: which of course did not apply. The meeting closed in the most excellent feeling, the Archbishop of Canterbury having won golden opinions by his mingled courtesy, dignity, gentleness, and consideration,"
