The above shows that, so far the present year, the deaths have been 2045 less than during the same period in 1866. If we deduct the deaths from cholera (910) in 1866, we still have a large margin in favor of 1867. Of the whole number of deaths the present year, 5709 were males and 5262 females. The number of children who died of the age of five years and under was 5107, or nearly one-half of the total mortality for the whole nine months, 832 of the whole number were over 70 years of age.

RAILEOAD CASUALTY .- Early on Sunday morning the body of a man was found on the track of the Reading Railroad, just above Pottstown, so much mutilated that it is thought a whole train of cars must have passed over it.
