PENNSYLVANIA ELECTION.

Berks County. Reading, Oct. 9.—In Reading and twenty-three districts of Berks county the Republican gain is 120, compared with Clymer's majority. Sharswood will have from 7500 to 8500 majority in the county.

The Tour of General Sheridan. WORCESTER, Mass., Oct. 9.—General Sheridan arrived here at 11 A. M. to-day, and was met at the Western depot by the Mayor and members of the City Government. The escort was composed of the Tenth Regiment State Guard, Highland Cadets, Leicester Cadets, and Post No. 10, G. A. R. The appearance of General Sheridan was the signal of loud and long-continued cheering. A salute was fired as he passed the Park, and the display of flags and decorations of red, white, and blue were profuse, giving to the city a Fourth-of-July appearance. At 10:20 the party left for Albany.

SUICIDE IN NEWTON, MASS.

A Man Blows His Brains Out in the Presence of His Family.

Boston, Oct. 8.—Henry P. Churchill, recently the firm of Churchill & Benson, real estate agents in this city, shot himself in the Montauk House, in Newton, last evening, in the presence of his family. He had been away for some time to escape arrest on a charge of forging a check for \$500 on the Newton Bank, in the name of his brother-in-law, George W. Bacon. He killed his wife and a couple of his children, laid down on a sofa, and without uttering any words of self-intention, shot himself twice through the heart.

Wendell Phillips on Temperance.

Mr. Wendell Phillips delivered a lecture in Boston, on Sunday evening, in favor of temperance and prohibition. He said:—"The temperance men will win nothing while they mingle themselves with Republicans at conventions, and allow their principles to be thrown overboard to lighten the ship. The Republicans would be afraid to lose the temperance men, and they must bring their earnestness to the polls; they must not wait till a majority is secured; a majority did not rule, it was brains that ruled, and the brains of earnest, live men must be brought into this contest. Secret associations must be met by secret associations, and organized movements by organized movements. When members of a liquor league go into a Republican Convention pledged not to support a candidate should be nominated by the majority there, if he was not in favor of a license law, then the temperance men should not be bound to support that candidate unless he was a prohibitionist. We must not sacrifice principle. May God dash that party to pieces which could not stand safe with the temperance cause in its hands!" In closing, Mr. Phillips said:—"By the living God, I swear, if there is a way to do it, if there is faith in man, and strength in the Government—if not now, then in the days of our children—these old streets of Boston shall be safe for even weak men to walk in."
