Edward Buckley sworn-Reside in the Nine-teenth Ward, Philadelphia; knew deceased since 1 was a boy; saw him on Wednesday morning.

A breastpin was here exhibited and recognized by witness as the property of the deceased He always carried a number of watches in his pocket.

Eliza Corsey sworn-Reside at Kaighnsville, with my mother and my sisters, Ghristina and Louisa Lewis; on Thursday afternoon I was at the house of Mary Bristow; Ehzabeth Chambers, Elizabeth Morris, and Mrs. Lotham reside in the same house; this was between 2 and 3 o'clock; Elizabeth Chambers' door was shut when I went up stairs; I went into Mrs. Bris-tow's room; I had been there about half an hour when Mrs. Chambers called me in; she said there was a man lying on the floor dead, he was cold all over; I saw a chair there; the man was lying at the left side of the chair; his head was nearest the chair; there was a looking-glass there which she got from one of the other rooms; she got it to hold over his face; I saw a double guard chain

on the man, and a watch; he had a breastpin in his pocket-book which she took from his pocket; there were a number of greenbacks, rings, and papers in it; one of the rings she put on her small finger; there were a number of watches in his pocket; she seemed surprised to see so many watches; she said she was going to keep them; she went away from the house and remained about a quarter of an hour; she took the watches and pocket-book; she came back

with Mr. Crosley. The case was then continued till Monday at 1 o'clock.
