The province of Cordova has risen in insurrection against the Government; several public officials, and even the Minister of War, who had been sent by the Central Government, were imprisoned, and several battalions of National Guard have left for the scene of dispress to restore order. Several other provinces are expected to rise unless the war is speedily terminated; and General Urquiza, the enemy of the alliance with Brazil, is said to excite the people to revolt. The allied forces are besieging and bombarding the fortress of Humaita, where Lopez, the Dictator of Paraguay, keeps himself at present, after having been routed out of all his strong positions; and it is expected he must soon capitulate. Thus the war is actually drawing to a close.

Postscriptum from the Beat of the War.—An engagement has taken place between a body of the allied troops and a detachment of the enemy. The Paraguayans had 150 men killed and a great many wounded; an officer and about 20 soldiers were taken prisoners. The passage of Curupatty has been forced. The squadron has effected the passage without being affected by the numerous torpedoes, which the skill of the pilots has known how to avoid. At 11 o'clock in the morning the squadron arrived at the port of Humaita, and commenced to open fire at 2 P. M., the strongest battery of the fort answering the fire. At the time of the departure of the mail boat, news reach us to the effect that the bombardment of Humaita continues, and that the steamboat Tamandare, which had her machinery damaged, is repaired and ready again for action. The shipping news of the port of Montevideo is of a cheerful character, and trade is on the increase, Out of the 671 vessels which arrived during the first quarter of 1867, 635 have unloaded their cargoes at that place. The number of vessels arrived in the ports of the Argentine Republic, Paraguay, and the Oriental Republic is 1618, carrying 340,675 tons. The number of passengers arrived from Europe during the same period amounts to 12,667.

FASHIONS FOR OCTOBER. From Le Follet.

According to the great preparations being made in the Paris houses, it appears that the coming winter season will abound in novelties. Many new patterns for the make of bodies have been shown by the modistes. Satisfied as they are that the gored skirts will be still preferred, they think that the bodies might still be rendered a little more varied and graceful. They are making them open in front, in "Louis XV" style, full back and front, out square or in points, corselets a la Princesse, etc. thing of which we can speak more decidedly is, that they will be more trimmed than they have been latterly. As for sleeves, we find the wide, open make is gradually reappearing,

The long dress also, it not made of broche material, is much trimmed, and we see that short costumes are rather more elaborately ornamented than formerly. Thus frequently the upper skirt will be trimmed with a jet fringe, headed with an embroidery of jet, the under skirt merely having an embroidery without fringe. For simpler costume—the material being alpaca, mohair, etc.—both skirts are usually just finished off by a plisse of the same, or perhaps lozenges of taffetas, matching the color of the dress. These lozenges, made in satin on a taffetas dress are year matter. Black to fine tagetter dress. a taffetas dress, are very pretty. Black taffetas robes are still very much trimmed round the bottom with an embroidery of jet beads. Short costumes of striped velvet are very dis-

tingue. These, of course, are quite without trimming, the upper skirt being draped with large buttons or silk cord and tassels. The Marie Antoinette fichu is universally admired—indeed, just now it may be called quite "the thing." It is made in all kinds of lace (black and white), muslin, net of the same material as the dress worn, and also of black taffetas prettily trimmed, and has been worn both as out-door and in-door dress. For the former, of course, the season is now too far ai-vanced, but it seems as much liked as ever, and

will retain its place as in-door costume. Lace is extremely fashionable, both woollen and silk. Wide ribbons have become so indispensable that they claim special notice in an article on le mode. Tout le mode wear them—ladies, girls, and little box. le mode. Tout le mode wear them—ladies, girls, and little boys. They are made of an immense width; some for ladies' wear are nearly half a yard, those for children a quarter of a yard wide; not to mention the Italian scart, which is still wider, but is made of an extremely soft silk, in several shaded colors, and is merely looped together without a bow. It is quite an art to the the bows of these ribbon sashes, as the form is of more importance than one might suppose. They must no longer be tied in two flat bows as formerly; there must be four—two upper bows like wings, and little boys wear them under their vests or paletots. However, it is not only for eashes that ribbon is required; we have it mised in the hair, for trimming dresses, and sometimes just tied round the upper part of the sleeve, about half-way between the elbow and the shoulder.

The Grant Family.

The Grant Family.

In the churchyard in Windsor, Connecticut, are a number of ancient tombstones erected to the memory of the Grant family. A genealogical investigator has traced General Grant's family back to its first appearance in this country. Matthew Grant and Susanna Hockwell salied from Plymouth, England, March 30, 1630, in the Mary and John, and arrived at Nantecket May 30. Mr. Grant settled at Dorchester, Massachusetts, but in 1635-5 removed to Connecticut, settled, with others, at New Dorchester, afterwards named Windsor, where for many years he was principal surveyor of land, town clerk, and deacon. Here he married, in 1665, Susanna Rockwell, then a widow, with five children. He died in 1631, aged eighty. Ruth Rockwell, the second daughter of Susanna Grant, married Christopner Huntington; their great granddaughter, Martha Huntington, married Noah Grant, a great grandson of Matthew. From this marriage came the second Noah Grant, a captain in the old Fronch war. The third son of this Captain Noah Grant, who also bore the name of Noah, resided in Coventry, Connecticut, and had a son name! for Hon. Jame Root, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Connecticut from 1796 to 1807, and this Jesse Root Grant is the father of Ulysses E. Grant.—New Haven Journal.
