MOYAMENSING .- Yesterday afternoon the Committee on Prisons paid a visit to Moyamensing Prison, and were shown through it by Mr. Perkins, the Superintendent. Owing to the crowded condition of the institution, it was re-solved to memorialize the Legislature for permission to enlarge the prison ground, by taking that portion of the Parade Ground extending as far westward as the line of S. Twelfth street and using it for prison purposes. The better method of conveying prisoners to and from the prison was also considered, as many of the prison vans, as at present constructed, are deicc.ive and objectionable.

It is proposed to subdivide them into two apartments, which will in a great measure tend

apartments, which will in a great measure tend to remedy them. The appropriation for the coming year was only partially considered, and will be the sub-ject of a future conference. The amount ap-propriated for prison purposes for the present year was \$145,012, but a less amount will be needed for the coming year. Although Moya-mensing is so greatly crowded, the best order and discipline prevail, and the Board of Inspec-tors give all necessary attention to the health, clean increase. cleantmess, and comfort of those committed to their care.

IMPROVEMENTS .- The Fourth National Bank has lately taken posse sion of their new banking house, Atch street, below Eighth. The new house, Atch atreet, below Eighth. The house apartments are immediately in the rear of the property formerly occupied by the bank, and consist of one large hall 42 feet by 77, and 26 feet in height. The walls are panelled, and light introduced principally through a large skylight in the ceiling, the glass being frosted. Heavy mouldings and the general finish of the room, with its walnut counters and desks, frescoed walls, and brouzed iron work, give a hall equal appearance to any banking establishment in Philadelphia.

The three new stores being crected on Chesnut street, above Twelfth, on the site of the Meschert mansion, are rapidly approaching completion, and will be ready for the tenants by the first of February. Each store is 25 feet front by 239 in deeth, four stories in height, and so arranged with skylights that, notwithstand-ing the great depth, every part of the building will be light. The marble front is of handsome design, and will add greatly to the architectural beauty of Chesnut street.
