Some of the items were for necessary improvements to the Municipal Hospital, concerning the necessities of which Mr. Pollock made an exhaustive exposition. The Chamber acknowledged itself enlightened by the explanation. The subject was ultimately referred.

Mr. Smith offered a petition from certain citi-zens asking that experiments may be made in laying the concrete pavement in South Broad street, with a view to test its value.

Mr. Barlow offered an ordinate to widen the footways on Broad street, from Poplar to Contes streets, to correspond in width with the pavement at Poplar street. Mr. Coleman explained that the Nicolson

pavement was about to be laid there, and that true conomy suggested the previous laying of this footway of uniform width.

It was referred to committee, with instruc-tions to report at the next meeting. Mr. Bumm offered a resolution of instruction

to the Chief Commissioner of High ways to permit the Philadelphia and Baltimore Steamship Company to erect a structure on the first wharf above Arch street. The business of the line has become so extensive that one wharf is in al-equate for their accommodation. They have leased the pier next to the one they occupy, upon which a building is necessary for the pro-tection of the valuable freight at all times piled upon their piers.

THE NORTHERN HOME FOR FRIENDLESS CHIL-DREN.-The Fourteenth Annual Report of the Northern Home for Friendless Children, sent to Councils vesterday, contains a detailed state-ment of the operations of the institution for the year ending May 1, 1867.
