THE PRATER-BOOK SOCIETY .- There was a large audience present last evening at the Church of the Epiphany, Fifteenth and Chesnut streets, on the occasion of the thirty-fourth anniversary of the above society. A large number of clergymen occupied seals in the chancel.

The exercises were opened with the usual evening service, after which the annual report of the Board of Managers was read by the Rev. Walter Mitchel. It states that the distribution of prayer books by the society, during the past year, to have been: Of the 18mo, edition, 4888 copies; of the 32mo, edition, 1071; total, 5959. These were distributed as follows: Pennsylvania, 1396 copies; New Jersey, 384; Oregon, 100; Indiana, 50; Maryland, 174; Kentucky, 300; Virginia, 242; Ohlo, 277; South Carolina, 100; North Carolina, 186; Minnesota, 350; Missouri, 255; District of Columbia, 20; Wisconsin, 112; North Carolina, 185; Minnesota, 350; Missour, 255; District of Columbia, 20; Wisconsin, 112; Alabama, 190; Tennessee, 186; Louisiana, 180; Michigan, 142; Georgia, 200; Missisuppi, 80; Texas, 36; Illuois, 49; Nebraska, 100; Africa, 50; Freedmen's Commission, 100; Seamen, 350; United States Army, 150; Public Institutions, 200. This is less than fifty per cent, of that of

last year, which was 12,761 copies.

The receipts for the year were:—From city of iladelphia, \$1491.42; outside of the city,

Philadelphia, \$149742; outside of the city, \$273'81; New Jersey, 21'99; Ohio, \$16'75; Maryland, \$24'60; Delaware, \$11'30; Missouri, \$21; Kentucky, \$43'20; Michigan, \$54; Wisconsin, \$1; and Alabama, \$5. Total, \$1964'07.

The report says "there is now not one dollar in the treasury, but there is a debt of \$378 due to our publishers for the books distributed, according to the above table, and there are applications now on file for 1200 copies."

Dr. Newton made an urgent appeal on behalf of the funds of the society, luding in eloquent terms to the necessity of the work performed by it, and reciting many instances of good that had been accomplished by the distribution of the Common Prayer Book.
A collection was then taken up, when the exercises were closed with the usual service.

NAUTICAL REVIEW .- A review of the Schuylkill Navy, for the reception of the new boat of the Philadelphia Clab, was held on Saturday afternoon last, in the presence of the Park Com-missioners and a number of the most prominent of our citizens. The weather was delightful, and crowds througed the banks to witness the

display.

The boats in line were the Undine, Atlanta, Hiawatha, Faugh-a Ballagh, Vesper, Lotus, Stranger, Thistle, and Cygnet, the whole under the command of Commodore Vezin, of the Undine Club.

The line was formed off Turtle Rock, and, at a shot from the Commodore's barge, the boats on the right and left gave way slowly towards Girard avenue bridge, upon reaching which double column was formed, and they returned to the starting point, the Commodore passing between the columns and receiving a salute

Two lines were then formed heading east and west, and at a given signal they started, and, as they came bow to bow, tossed oars in salute, and turned slowly up the river to the bridge, each barze falling in behind the leading boats, and returned in single column, saluting and cheering the commissioners.

After the review a scrub race was participated the barges Atlanta (six oars), Undine Club; Hiawatha (six oars), of the Malta Club; Faugh-a-Ballagh (six oars), of the Phila-delphia Club; Stranger (four oars), of the Pennsylvania Club; Cygnet (four oars), of the Quaker City Club, which was decided in favor of the Atlanta, the Hiawatha being second, Faugha-Bailagh third, Stranger fourth, and Cygnet

The evolutions were performed with an exac ness and rapidity that evinced the most per-fect discipline, and called forth loud cheers from the multitude that witnessed them.

RECTIFIERS AND DISTILLERS .- The Rectifiers' and Distillers' Association have resolved to suspend the distillation of liquor for two weeks from to-day. They offer a reward of one hundred dollars to the revenue officials for the capand destruction of any illicit distillery in this city.

The distillers give various reasons for stopping

operations, one of them being that whisky is selling at too low a figure, considering the high price of grain; and they think by stopping for two weeks or longer the price of whisky will advance, and the cost of grain will come down. Another one is that they are much annoyed at the visits of two Revenue Inspectors dailyone in the morning and one in the afternoonwho make daily separate reports of the condition of the distilleries at the time of their

There are a number of distillers who do not belong to the association, and they will, no doubt, continue in operation, but it is not known what action the association will take in regard to these parties.

Immense trauds are perpetrated daily in the rectifying business. It is said large quantities of spirits are removed from distiller as properly stamped and gauged, which should go to the bonded warehouse, but instead of be there it is left at some rectifying establishment, and that it is removed again, marked rectified, without one cent of tax being paid upon it.

SUNDAY SCHOOL ANNIVERSARY .- The twentysixth anniversary of the Calvary Baptist Sunday School was held yesterday afternoon at the church, Fifth street, below Carpenter. The exercises consisted of the usual religious services, addresses by the Rev. L. P. Hornberger, Rev. John A. McKean, and Rev. Dr. Cooper; reading of the superintendent's report, and the presentation of offerings by the several classes. From the report of the superintendent, Mr. Walter McFarland, we gather the following: Superintendents of the school, 3; librarians, 2; teachers 25; scholars, 280; number of volumes in the library, 1000. The anniversary celebration was well attended, and the exercises were interesting throughout.

AN OLD MANSION DEMOLISHED. - On Saturday last the tearing down of one of the oldest houses in Philadelphia was commenced. The house in question is located in Third street, above Reed, and was erected in the year 1760. It is, consequently, 167 years old. Forty years ago, when Christian street formed the southern boundary of the old District of Southwark, and the whole country south of that was used for agricultural purposes, the building referred to was considered far in the country. The building is to be re-moved to make way for the erection of a Protestant Egiscopul church.

NARROW ESCAPE PROM DROWNING. - On Saturday afternoon, as a number of men were engaged at the Navy Yard wharf in raising a large archor, the tackle gave way, and one of the workmen was whirled from his position, over the wharf, but saved himself from falling into the river by holding on to the rope. The balance of the men also made a narrow escape from being injured by the falling derrick.
