The Bodies of the Conspirators-The Removal of the Penitentiary.

Recently the authorities at the Arsenal have erected headboards over the trench in which the bodies of the conspirators are buried, bearing the names, respectively, of the persons buried. It is understood that this is done in compliance with the orders of the War Department, in order to "keep a record of them." It will be recollected that about a month since all of the bodies were removed from their original graves to No. 1 warehouse, where they were placed side by side in one trench, about ten feet from the north wall. Booth's body, which had been buried about ten feet deep in the store-room of the Penitentiary building, was placed on the right (nearest the east wall), and the bodies of the other conspirators—Mrs. Surratt, Payne, Harold, and Atzerott, with that of Henry Wirz, the Andersonville jailor, which had been interred near the scaffold in the yard of the Penitentiary—were placed in the bodies of the conspirators are buried, bearin the yard of the Penitentiary—were placed in the above order, as they originally rested in the yard. The north ead of the building bears a novel appearance now, with the mound raised and the headboards placed on the north side of it. The removal of the bodies, as heretofore stated by us, was rendered necessary by the contemplated improvement, it being apparent that the proposed grade, where the penitentiary building now stands, would be below where the bodies were hereful. bodies were buried.

Notwithstanding the difficulty experienced by the contractor for taking down the old penitentary building in obtaining bands, he has commenced the work, but has less than a dozen men employed, who have thus far taken up the pavements, and are now at work on the east wall of the main south yard. It is stated that the authorities will hold him to the contract, and in case of failure sue the sureties on his bond,—Wash. Stor.

The Catastrophe at the Hoosac Tuanel. The Troy Whig has the following relative to the accident at the central shaft of the Hoosac

Tunnel:—

'At 4 o'clock on Monday afternoon Mr. Mallory again descended the shaft about 400 feet, when the lights that preceded him were extinguished by the foul sir, and he was compelled to return. He made no new discoveries in regard to the bodies of the men killed by the accident. The contractors contemplated lowering a boat upon the water and grappling for the men at the bottom of the shaft, but the second attempt to descend developed the fact that no man could live ten minutes 500 feet down the shaft; consequently the idea was abandoned. It is not probable that the bodies will be recovered until a new building is constructed and new machinery and pumps put in operation to throw out the new building is constructed and new machinery and pumps put in operation to throw out the water and introduce purer air into the shaft, which, in all probability, will require two months to accomplish. The building, machinery, wood, lumber, and other material destroyed is estimated at \$100,000, which, we understand, by the terms of the contract, falls upon the Chicago contractors, who, be it said to their credit, did everything that human skill and ingenting everything that human skill and ingenuity could do to rescue the men alive from their could do to rescue the men alive from their terrible position. The shaft is 600 feet deep, with platforms constructed every 50 feet to within 75 feet from the bottom, with escape ladders from one to the other. Had there been an escape ladder from the bottom to the first platform, a distance of 75 feet, those not injured by the bucket and drills that went down at the first onset might possibly have escaped with their lives. The water flows into the shaft at the rate of 16 feet in 24 hours, and will require about 36 days to fill it to the top."

The court-room was literally packed, Mr. Charles S. Spencer represented the typographical artists, and demanded an exhaustive examination; but Justice Hogan cut off remark by dismissing the complaint. Mr. Spencer, whose clients really desired such a ventilation of facts as an examination was sure to yield, indignantly preferred informal charges, which the Court held to be personal, and smacking of contempt. High words followed, and Mr. Spencer was roundly cheered. At length, Justice Hogan, still unwilling to enter-tain the charge against the printers, Messrs. Manne and O'Rourke, retired, and the multitude dispersed. It is understood that the New York Typographical Union has 1000 members in good financial standing, with 2000 sympathizers whose names are not on the books.—N. Y. Tri-
