Convention. The motion called forth considerable discusston, in the course of which Rev. Dr. Breckin-ridge argued the impossibility of perfecting a basis that would meet with the approbation of

all represented. After further debate, which was participated in by Rev. Drs. D. W. McLean, Donaldson, and Marshall, Rev. Wilson Francer moved that the subject be referred to the Commistee on Arrangements.

Rev. Dr. Musgrave opposed the motion to refer, believing that an organic union was not only possible but practicable. The motion was finally withdrawn.

The question then being put, the original mo-Rev. Mr. Bratton offered the following resolu-

Inasmuch as this Convention in its organization has departed from the plan proposed by the Reformed Presbyterian Church, therefore Resoived, That this Convention be regarded as the Convention of the day. Laid on the table.




