Terrible Revolution in Peru-War on the River Plate-The Allies Suffer-

- ing Greatly-New Gold Mines, Etc.

[SPECIAL DESPATCH TO EVENING TELEGRAPH.] NEW YORK, Nov. 9 .- Advices from South America, just received, state that another extensive revolution is in progress in Peru.

At last accounts President Prado was prepar-Ing to attack Arcquips, where all of the regular Government officers had been assassinated by the rebels. Reinforcements of troops were hourly expected from Chill.

The navigation of the Amazon river has been opened to a point within fifty miles of the Pacific Quean.

Many new gold and silver mines have been 'discovered in Peru, and companies are pre-

paring to work them. The shipping of fire-arms to Peru has been prohibited by the Chilian Government.

The war in Paraguay has turned against the allied forces, who have suffered many defeats. General Lopez has been largely reinforced in front of Humaita.

THE BRADLEY CASE

Judge Fisher's Action Sustained.

Mr. Bradley Suspended as a Practitioner at the Bar.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9 .- In the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia to-day, Mr. Bradley read a statement in answer to the rule of the Court for him to show cause why he should not be excluded from the bar as a practising attorney, owing to his former difficulty with Judge Fisher. The Hon. Robert J. Walker made an argument in his behalf, when the full Court, through Chief Justice Cartter, sustained the order of Judge Fisher, heretofore made, suspending Mr. Bradley as a practitioner at the bar. Justice Cartter, in the course of his remarks, said it was a painful duty, but it was necessary that the Court should sustain its dignity and punish the contempt.

Mr. Bradley thanked the Court for the delicate manner in which it had announced its decision, but said that he had long ago contemplated retiring altogether from the bar, but that the present manner of severing his connection with the courts rendered the separation more unpleasant.

ALABAMA.

The Reconstruction Convention-Propesitions Referred to Organize a Provisional Government for the State-Resolutions Offered to Substitute a Property Tax for the Poll Tax, and to Give Laborers' Wages the First Lien Upon Crops After Rent and Supplies.

MONTGOMERY, Nov. 8 .- In the Convention today Mr. Gregory (colored) offered a resolution instructing the Committee on a Bill of Rights to incorporate in their report a special ordinance removing all distinctions based in caste or color. A resolution was offered substituting a property tax for the poll tax, and another disfranchising all persons engaged in the murder of Union men, but who have been acquitted by the courts. An ordinance was passed formally abolating slavers.

The Convention, in a test vote of forty-five to forty-two, tabled the proposition to abolish the present Provisional State Government within

An ordinance was offered and referred to the appropriate committee, affirming that since 1861 no loyal government has existed in Alabama and that whereas such tillegal and pretended government as now exists does not protect ade-quately the rights of loyal men, the Convention should organize a provisional government, all important State offices being vacated within

thirty days after December 1. It also provides that a provisional Governor should be appointed by the Convention, who shall fill all vacated offices, all persons appointed being required to take the iron-clad oath. A motion to lay the ordinance on the table was defeated by a vote of fifty-seven to twenty-six, and it will probably be ultimately adopted. The negroes and the extreme members of the Con-vention, headed by Bingham, will vote for it. An ordinance was also referred that laborers' wages shall take precedence over all other liens upon crops, except rent and supplies.

The Parliament in Session-Resignation of the Minister of Fluance-A Telling Anti-Union Speech-The New Government of Nova Scotin.

OTTAWA, Nov. 8.—At 3 o'clock P. M. to-day the House of Commons met to consider the speech from the throne.

It was moved by Mr. C. Fisher, of New Brunswick, and seconded by Mr. DeSalnier, in the French language, that an address in answer to the speech from the throne be prepared, which was carried.

The address will be a mere echo of the speech. Mr. Galt then arose to explain his motives for Mr. Galt then arose to explain his motives for resigning his position in the Government. He said that there was a feeling of distrust felt towards him in Ontario, and that he had been charped with the ruin of families by the failure of certain banks. The Commonwealth ex rel. Charles Sydney, vs. the Sheriff. A writ of habeas corpus sued out for the discharge, of the relatior from the charge of malicious mischief. Some time since the School Board contracted with a builder for the erection of a school house at Seventeenth and Wood streets. This contract was subsequently subletted. V. Hahna, a plaster. The contract between the School Board and the builder gave to the architect the right to alter or destroy any work on the building; in his judgment improperly done. The relator answered that this was done by the anthority of the contract; that he was acting as the agent of the city, by the order of the city, and upon the property of the city. It was just the city left altering certain property and therefore the city, or its agent, should not be held criminally answerable for the act.

The Court sustained this latter doctrine, and discharged the relator.
