This Chanfrau consented to do, but upon the following day, when Quirk demanded the money, Chanfrau refused to pay. Quirk then declared that he would fight him for the amount. Chanfrau replied that Quirk was the better man, and he would only fight him with revolvers at fourteen paces fifty-one feet). The bargain was at once closed. A man, named James Hayes, formerly of West Hickory, was selected as Quirk's second, and another, named McCarty, from Salt Lake City, performed the same service for Chanfrau, while Tom Dillon was elected referee.
