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#### REVIEW OF NEW BOOKS.

THIODOLF THE ICELANDER. By Baron Fouque, New York: James Miller & Co. Philadelphia Agent: G. W. Pitcher, No. 808 Chesnut afreet. I This work is considered by Fouqué as his chef d'œuvre, and it certainly ranks high among its kind. It is written in that piquant style for which the French are noted. It is full of improbable adventures. It is racy in details, and savors of the miraculous. It stands high among the standard foreign works of fiction. It is admirably suited to the taste of a certain class of readers. It is indifferently translated, and, finally, it is worthy of the attention of all those who enjoy that class of writings of which "Hans of Iceland" is the type, and of which society Thiodolf is a most noted and worthy leader.

FOUR OAKS. A Novel. By Kamba Thorpe. Carleton, Philadelphia Agents: T. B. Peter-son & Brothers.

"Four Oaks" is the stereotyped novel of the day, with a few additional touches, with a change of name and a change of dress in the characters, but the plot is the old, old story, and if we add a flavor of the improbable to the regular scheme of novelists, we have a picture of the latest work by Kamba Thorpe. It is not a badly written work, it is in some parts a remarkably clever work, yet on the whole our judgment holds good in saying that it is like a soldier in the line; it may be longer as he may be taller than his fellows, he has his distinct name as has it, yet to look at him from a general standpoint, he is uniformed the same and looks the same as his fellows. So does "Four Oaks" appear when compared with its contemporary novels.

YOUNG AMERICA ABROAD; OR, THE SHAMROUK AND THISTLE. By Ollver Optic, Boston; Lee & Sheppard, Philadelphia Agent; G. W. Pitcher.

Oliver Optic is probably the most popular living writer for boys. He treats of his subject in that quiet vein of familiarity which takes the young reader along with him in all his miratives, and makes him feel a personal interest in the story told. In that, after all, lies the great success of writers for children. It is to enter fully into the spirit of the adventures, and by so doing to take the reader along with you. The present work is one of a series, and treats, as its name indicates, of the sights seen and adventures met with by the boys when in Ireland.

All the broad satire and coarse fon which made the "Widow Bedott Papers" so popular are repeated in "Widow Spriggins." It is a work with a vast supply of humor, but of the boldest kind. Not possessing, in any respect, the quiet wit of Hood or Jerrold, it yet excels in its peculiar vein, and as a racy work merits commendation. Its wit is of course comparatively inferior to that of the great authors of humorous works; but it is, as a relaxation, an enjoyable work. It is for sale by T. B. Peteron & Brothers.
