THE TORTOLA DISASTER.

The Story Di-credited in England and in Havana.

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LONDON, Nov. 18 .- The Colonial Office has no advices of the Tortola disaster, and hence the story is discredited.

HAVANA, Nov. 18 .- Neither the British Consul ner any other party here has received any porticulars of the alleged sinking of the island of Tortela and drowning of ten thousand inbabitants. There are only rumors of serious disasters by the hurricane on the 29th of October, but no definite facts, and the report is evidently greatly exeggerated.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 .- We learn that a private letter from Tortola, written 1st inst., has been received in this city, making brief reference to the hurricane which swept over the island on the 29th of October, but it makes no mention of any general loss of life. The writer states, how, ever, that the family of Sinclair Bryant, Resideat Magistrate at Road Town, as the settlement harbor is called, were drowned, and also that during the storm a fearful fire broke out, which destroyed many houses.

Boston, Nov. 18. - The statue of Edward Everett, by Story, was unveiled in the public garden this morning. Governor Andrew was to have delivered the oration, but his death induced the Committee to dispense with all pub-

Bosron, Nov. 18 .- The schooner Bonny Bost of Dennis, from Gloucester for Philadelphia, put into Newport on Saturday, with loss of foretopmast and mainsail.

The schooner Tolone, of Egg Harbor, from Wilmington, N. C., for Boston, is ashore in Holmes Hole, and will have to lighten to get off.

From Worcester, Mass. WORCESTER, Mass., Nov. 18 .- Shephard, the wife murderer, was captured in Canterbury, Conn., this morning. He was observed coming ont of a barn, where he had slept, and was soon taken, without any resistance. The officers will reach this city with their prisoner this afternoon.

Ship News. FATHER POINT, Nov. 18 .- The Nova Scotia passed here to-day for Quebec.

The Next Presidency.

General Grant has issued a special order honorably mustering out of the service Major-General Sickles and Brigadier-General Scott. The order takes effect from the 1st of January. The following is a copy of the order:-By direction of the President, the services of

the following-named officers being no longer needed, they are hereby honorably mustered out of the service of the United States, to take effect January 1, 1868. "Major-General Daniel E. Sickles, U. S. Volun-

"Brigadier General R. K. Scott (Brevet Major-General) U. S. Volunteers."
