The following communication to the Atta California, from Professor George Davidson, will be read with interest by havigators:

U. S. Coast Survey Expedition to Alaska, Aug. 8, 1857.)

Editors Alta—I would respectfully call your attention to the fact that the British Admiralty chart. No. 2661 of the Pacific Coast. from Rock Rever to the Gulf of California, with the lines of equal magnetic declination and corrections of the cost line, etc., to March, 1865, has a light on Punta de los Reyes, marked Lt. Fi. (flashing light): also one at the mouth of Umpquariver. The fact is there never has been a light or building on Point Reyes, and that at the Limpqua has not existed for several years. The Russian corvette Novick was wrecked two miles north of Point Reyes some years since, having been misled by an English chart with a light marked thereon.

This map, 2461, is also defective in not having upon it the very extensive shoal "Banco Cortes" developed on the French Hydrographical chart. 1779. Impray's new map of the Pacific Coast, published in 1867, with all the improvements and discoveries of the Coast 80 revey, unacknowledged, has no sign of the above bank.

The Directory of the Pacific Coast of the United States for 1862 gives its position, extent, and soundlings.


