Lyle. John M. Butler was called to the chair, and Robert T. Gill was selected to act as

Secretary.
A committee of fifteen was appointed to make arrangements for the funeral, to set in conjunction with the committee of the Fairmount Fire Company.

1t was agreed that each company should be

left to decide how many of their members should be in the line of parade. It was stated that the remains of the deceased would be at the house of the Fairmount Fire Company on the morning of the funeral, and that they would be conveyed from thence to the place of interment, the Odd Fellows' Cemetery. Appropriate resolutions were adopted.

The Farmount Engine Company was, on motion, requested to act as a guard of honor on the day of the funeral.
