Times, of a recent date, has the following flattering notice of a rising young sculptor who is a native of this citywho is a native of this city---"Those who go to Florence will do well to pay a visit to the studio of a young soulptor there, named Connelly, who, judging from what he has already done, gives promise of a very rare order of excel-lence in his art. He is, we understand, not above 20, an American by birth, but educated in this country, at Mariborough College, and was intended for an ensincer, but, abandoning that profession in favor of painting, for which he had a strong natural talent, he underwent a course of severe anatomical and other entitleer, but, abarboning that protection in throw of painting, for which be had a strong natural talent, he underwent a coure of severe anatomical and other studies at Dusseldorf, and subsequently in Paris, whence he weut to Florence, intending to finish them there, where, however, he made the acqueintance of his rminent fellow-countryman, Hiram Powers, who, on seeing his first attempt at modelling, strongly urged him to abandon painting and devote himself to sculpture, which he at once did, Powers generously giving him from time to time such instruction as he has be needed, and taking the liveliest interest in his progress. The result was, that before he had worked at his new profession two years he had modelled an ideal bust of Shakespeare's Cordella. for which, when subsequently produced by him in marble, he readily obtained one hundred guineas, and orders for two 'copies o' it at the same price. He has, we understand, been equally successful with his likenesses in busta and with hydres."
