REVIEW OF NEW BOOKS.

A MEMOIR OF THE LIFE AND LABORS OF FRANCES WAYLAND, D. D., LL.D. By His Sons, Francis Wayland and H. L. Wayland, 2 volumes, Sheldon & Co., 1867, Philadelphia Agents: J. B. Lippincott & Co.

We doubt if there has been any man who has written on political science in America who can compare with Dr. Wayland in point of the influence he exerted. Our fellow townsman, Henry C. Carey, Esq., has done much, but being later in the field, and adopting a style rather fitted for the scholar than the beginner, he has not reached that wide circle into which Dr. Wayland entered. In almost all of the schools of the learned where moral or political science is taught, we find an abridgment of his works. He was a most industrious writer, freely discussing, at great length and generally. with great clearness, the elementary principles of the science, and is well fitted by style and train of thought to supply a text book for the young. Being thus a household work, we do not doubt that the carefully prepared life published by his sons will meet with a most cordial reception.

The Doctor was born in New York in 1796, and died at Saratoga in 1865, being, therefore, in his seventieth year. From his youth he had devoted himself to his favorite study, and there are few enterprises for the advancement of religion or education undertaken Juring the fifty years of the Doctor's active life that we do not find him associated with. In 1823 he published the first of his discourses it was an essay on the "Meral Dignity of Man," and from that time until a month of his death it seems his pen was never idle. During forty years the Doctor published seventy-three works of various kinds, some of course being pamphlets. His "Political Science" and his 'Moral Science' have gone through numberless editions, and have served a valuable purpose in directing the attention of the student to a subject which requires all the smoothing of the pathway which is possible. At the allotted age of man he was gathered to his fathers. universally lamented and respected. His "Memoira" are copiously filled with diaries and correspondence, and much credit is due to his sons for the excellent literary style of the work.

THE LOVERS' DICTIONABY. A Poetical Treasury of Lovers' Thoughts, Fancies, Addresses, and Dilemmas, or a Dictionary of Compliments and a Guide to the Study of the Tender Sci-ence. New York: Harper & Bros. Phila-de phia Agents: J. B Lippincott & Co:

A big work, we suppose, has a right to a big title, and as the present volume extends ver 789 pages, we must grant the compiler the privilege of the monstrously long descripion on his title page. In promising to furnish an "complete work" on the subject we think the author went a great way, but it seems as hough he had fulfilled his pledge. If the 'Tender Science' (?) can be learned by rote, or if lovers can get out of their dilemmas by reference to an index of ten thousand approoriate lines, then we commend the "Dictionary" to the afflicted. We do not pretend to know whether the formality of a few choice "compliments" will mollify a lady's anger or not, but as there are an enormous number "soft sayings" collected, the rejected one can have his choice. To one class, however, the work will prove blessing. We refer to young gentlemen who lesire appropriate original poetry. By investng in the "Dictionary," they can secure an bundant supply, and the size of the book prevents a detection of the plagairism by searchng the work. To them it will be invaluable. But to people, as a whole, we do not think hat the "Dictionary" will prove a very aceptable work of reference. As a rule, after certain age, lovers' quotations appear rather rite. It too frequently happens that romance departs:-

"And marriage, or death, or division Make barren our lives." So we would advise the publishers to keep the work stereotyped, for each generation will want a copy when it falls in love; but no ustom will flow from the people after a certain age is past. The work has the appropriate device on the back of two doves and an clive branch, and is prefaced by two engravings evidently taken from "London Society."

ELEMENTS OF PHYSICAL GEOGRAPHY. By John Brocklesby. A. M. E. H. Butler & Co., Phila The author is right in prefacing his work ith the assurance that it is "unnecessary to Indicate the right of Physical Geography te'a permanent place among the studies of our schools, academies, and high institutions of learning." The unanimous testimony of those best qualified to judge, and the value of the science itself, demand for it a high place in the curriculum of every school. We hall with pleasure the work now before us. It is an admirable text-book, combining in a singular harmony the advantages of an essay and of an atlas. It is filled with illustrations which impress its principles on the mind of the student, and is in every respect worthy of the high standard accorded to all "Mitchell's Series." Messrs. Butler & Co. have handsomely pubshed it in a form for dally use, and the anthor, by following the idea of the globe being an organized body, makes a clear and an intetesting work. The latest of Mr. Bennett's stories is before us. It is entitled the "Phantom of the Forest," and depicts pioneer life in Kentucky when that territory well merited the name of the "dark and bloody ground." It fully sustains the author's high reputation. It combines all the wild adventures of the huntsman's life with just sufficient of the romance of the love-tale to make it possess the merits of each. It is handsomely published by John E. Potter & Co., who, we are glad to understand, are about to issue a uniform edition of all of Mr. Bennett's works.
