The number in attendance was sixteen thousand, and the examinations were conducted with closed doors by a literary chancellor named Lieu, assisted by a vice-chancellor named Wong, both of whom were sent down from Pekin. The second most remarkable fact was the large number of deaths that occurred in the stalls, amounting to'seventy.
