A Forger and His Operations.—In The Evening Telegraph of some days ago, a juli report was given of the arrest of a forger, Joseph B. Dawson by name. Yesterday afternoon he had a full snowing up at a hearing before Alderman Toland, and the fact of his being an old and incontrovertibly cunning forger, was established. The first witness called was Mr. C. A. Pearson, teller of the Central National Hark. He stated that on or about the 17th of October, Mr. E. A. Lynd, of this city, came into the bank with Dawson, and introduced him to to the officers, saying that he had been recommended to do business with that institution by several letters, purporting to be from A FORGER AND HIS OPERATIONS,-In The tion by several letters, purporting to be from well known and influential citizens of Pitts burg. At the same time Dawson presented a draft from Pittsburg which he wanted cashed, but this was not done for some reason. Mr. Lynd and the alleged forger went out, and in about half an hour the latter returned. He sid that, upon considering the matter of the draft with Mr. Lynd, that gentleman had agreed to take it himself paying over a check for the draft. take it himself, paying over a check for \$150. This, Dawson presented for payment. The teller scrutinized the check, and refused payment on the ground that the signature was cuted, and looked very little like Mr. Lynd's signature.

Mr. Pearson, however, said that if Mr. Lynd would indorse the back of the check with the statement that the signature was bonafide, that he would cash it. Dawson left, and soon re-turned with the check endorsed "O. K., E. W. Lynd," but this signature was even as bad as the other, and payment was for some time re-fused; but Dawson in extenuation for the bad writing, said that Mr. Lynd and himself had been having a convivial glass together, and that the writer's hand had become rather shaky. With this explanation, which was given in an earnest manner, the check was cashed. It is almost needless to say that in due time its spurious nature was discovered, as was

the false explanation given by Dawson.

Now the next witness called was one Maris Taylor, a young man, and an accomplice of the cunning Dawson. He turned State's evidence on the principle of securing the larger bird by letting the smaller fly—and said that he had been sent to the Central National Bank to receive \$37 on a check bearing on its face the signature of E. W. Lynd, forged by Dawson; that when he received the \$37, with a wise forethought of his own pecuniary circumstances, he appropriated \$30, and returned the rest to Dawson; that at another time Dawson wanted money, and he sent Taylor first to Maurice & Co., on Chesnut street, and then to the Northern Liberties Bank, to procure some blank checks, and when he had got them, Dawblank checks, and when he had got them, Daw-son and one of his associates went into a saloon on Girard avenue, in which the forger was eventually arrested, and there they forged a check on the Northern Liberties Bank for \$75, attaching to it the false signature of Messrs. Ellis & Harrop, dry goods dealers on Market street; that they sent him (Taylor) to the Bank to get it cashed, when he was arrested. He further stated that Dawson used to have a room at the Continental, where he forged checks by at the Continental, where he forged checks by the wholesale, and before the very eyes of him who was being gradually initiated into the

secrets and peculiarities of the great crime.

Then there was another complainant, Mr.
Horbacher, who alleged that Dawson had sneaked into his store, and had stolen two valuable gold watches. Upon this testimony Joseph B. Dawson was committed in default of \$5000 hall in \$4000 hall to answer for his forms. 55000 ball, in \$4000 ball to answer for his forge-ries, and in \$1000 ball to appear at Court and answer for his robberies. 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

sion yesterday. The excitement in the city last evening was very great, and nearly all the morning journals to-day have editorials on the subject.

The entire press seems to be of the opinion that the time for lenity towards the Fenians has passed. The Times is particularly decided in its remarks, and closes a lengthy article with the following words:-"Let there be no more clemency for Fenianism, which is a mixture of treason and assassination."

Rumors are current that Colonel Kelly, the Fenian prisoner who was rescued at Manchester . is in England, notwithstanding the stories to the contrary, and that he is still directing the movements of the Fentan brotherhood. There are those who openly assert that the explosion at Clerkenville was the result of one of Kelly's schemes.

FROM WASHINGTON THIS P. M.
