Gnadeloupe, and it seemed as if the town of Basseterre was on fire. HAYTI.

Brutal Murder of General Montes-Supposed Complicity of Saluave.

HAVANA, Dec. 11, via Lake City, Dec. 12,-General Leon Mon'es was killed by the jailor first poisoned, and then despatched by a blow on the head from a bar. A brother of Montes, confined in the same durgeon with the General at Cape Haytien, was compelled to passively witness the scene of horror. Many families have emigrated to Jamaica, horrided at the doings now going on in Hayti.

VIRGIN ISLES.

Exaggeration of the First Accounts Relating to the Earthquake.

HAVANA, Dec. 14.—By the steamer Barcelona, from St. John's, P. R., we have the news that the first account of the damage done at St. Bar-tholomew's by the volcanic eruption and at St. Martin's by the great tidal wave that accompa-nied the earthquake was exaggerated, owing to the panic that seized the inhabitants after the movements of the earthquake had been feit. The sea rushed towards the islands, covering parts of the coast, the same as it had done at

PORTO RICO.

Damage by the Earthquakes Slight-Activity in Repairing the Losses. HAVANA, Dec. 14 .- From Mayaguez we have dates to the 4th inst. The news confirms the previous account of an earthquake on November 18. The shocks were very violent in the first instance. No considerable damage was done, except to some sugar houses. The alarm of the people was, however, terrible. The sugar crop is good, but will be slow in reaching market. Great activity is displayed in repairing the damage done to the estates by the rains, the harricane, and the earthquake.

MEXICO.

Romero to be Minister for Foreign Af-fairs-His Reputation Mude in Mexico -The San Luis Election.

HAVANA, Dec. 12, via Key West, Dec. 14.— The steamer Fah Kee has arrived here from Vera Gruz with news from that port to the 4th It was rumored that government had ordered the republication of all the treaties made by European nations with governments

pretending to represent Mexico.

Ex-Minister Romero is considered now an arch-diplomat, and it is said that he will succeed Lerdo de Tejada in the Ministry for Foreign Affairs. The change has been suggested by the mutual interests which Mexico has under present complications with her sister republics of the southern part of our continent. Considerable scandal has been given by the accounts published of the means to which Don Juan Bustamente resorted in order to secure his election as Governor o San Luis Potosi. The diligences had been robbed by soldiers at Patzcuare.

CUBA.

Cubs and Porto Rico Sold to Uncle Sam for One Hundred and Fifty Millions in Gold-What is Thought of the Bargain in Cuba-A Speculation on the Strength

HAVANA, Dec. 12, via Lake City, Dec. 13.—We have further and authentic news from Madrid in relation to the sale of the Spanish West Indian possessions. It conveys the important information that the Spanish Government had made a form al offer to the American Minister at Mairid, Hon, John P. Hale, to sell the islands of Cuba and Porto Rico to the United States for one hundred and fifty millions of dollars in gold.

The te. ms of sale are as follows: -Fifty million dollars to gold are to be paid down in cash on the signing of the treaty and the formal delivery of the Island to the authorities of the United States. A second lifty million dollars in gold to be paid one year thereafter. The third instal-ment of fifty millions in gold to be paid at the

end of six years. The proble beart is beating with anxiety at the announcement, and great excitement are vails, as the extinguishment of slavery here will be one of the consequences of the sale. It was hope d by some that Spain would abolish the least of the sale. the institution in time to save her national

The acquisitions made by the United States from Russia and Denmark, that of Louisiana from France, and Florida from Spain herself, are now referred to as precedents that leave the anal honor of Spain in this bargain unas-

The snarp scent of Yankee speculation is instanced by the fact that an American company has already, on the strength of the above reports, purchased Guajaba I-land, near Nuevitas. They intend to colonize it, and are about to put thirty thousand acres of it under cultivation. Thus the last hopes of slave traders are gone.

Reduction of the Police Force-Captain McMahon, of the Iron-ciad Tetuan-Cholera Reports for Spain Discon-

Key West, Dec. 12, via Lake City, Dec. 13.— The Havana police force has been reduced onethird, for the sake of economy. There are rumors here that the commander of the Tetuan, Captain James McMahon, will resign his command. The cholera reports furnished to the Spanish Government by telegraph have been discontinued for some days past. Senor Aranu-tave, the inspector of telegraphs in Cuba, has quite recovered from his late severe illness.

THE WEST INDIES. Royal Danish Proclamation at St. Thomas-Change of Nationality of the Inhabitents—Supply of Breadstuffs-Earthquake Shocks at Antigua.

HAYANA, Dec. 14 .- Late files from St. Thomas, dated on the 2d inst., bring the text of the royal Danish proclamation transferring the island to the United States by right of purchase. The document appears in the St. Thomas Times of the 30th of November.

It concedes to the inhabitants of St. Thomas. according to circumstances and residence, a period of two years to effect a complete change of nationality under the new regime. At St. Thomas, on the 2d instant, flour was plenty, and rating at \$11.50 a barrel for sorted. Advices from Antiqua of the 25th of November state that the island had been visited by several shocks of earthquake—one occurring on the 18th and another on the 22d of the month, Rain had fallen during a fortelight, with a strong southwest wind.
