RELIGIOUS NEWS.

-Colonel James, of Urbana, is writing a History of the New Church in America. -Bishop Simpson lectured in Wesley Chapel, Cincinnati, on Monday evening, upon "The Life and Character of Abraham Lincoln."

-Mr. Jay Cooke has built a beautiful meeting house for the Methodists at Girardville, Pa., and the Rev. D. D. Hudson has been appointed its pastor.

-The new Methodist Episcopal meeting-house at Canton, Pa., of which the Rev. J. Thompson is pastor, is to be dedicated on the 9th of January. The Rev. Dr. Mattison, of Jersey City, will preach.

-The Treasurer of the General Convention of the New Jerusalem Church in the United States has received \$13,227.53, towards a \$20,000 fund for publishing Swedenborg's works, and keeping the same for sale in the depository.

-During the last six years twenty-two Congregational and three Independent churches have been organized in Northern Illinois, and forty-three houses of worship have been erected, all but eight by missionary churches. Nineteen have become self-supporting.



This section is all under contract, and a large force is now at work for its completion. The Company in-tend to complete this last section of their road by the 1st of November next. It is expected that the whole line will then be in complete running order from Albany to Binghamton, a distance of one hundred and forty miles. From Nineveh a road will be built connecting with this, and running thence down into Luzerne county, Pennsylvania, where it will connect with the various railroads of that part of the State.

-The will of the late James P. Dickerman, of New Haven, gives to the American Home Mission of New York \$10,000; American Bible Society, \$10,000; American and Foreign Christian Union, \$10,000; American Board of For-eign Missiens, of Boston, \$5,000; New Haven Orphan Asylum, \$2,000; \$5,000 in trust for the aid of City Missions in New Haveu; American Seaman's Friend Society, of New York, \$5,000; American Missionary Association, \$5,000; and the residue of his estate he leaves to the American Home Missionary Society, of New York. Upon his information, Thayer & Lincoln of No. 13 Commercial street, Boston, are now being tried before the United States District Court for receiving the smuggled goods.

-Bishop Morris, senior Bishop of the M. R. Church, is in his seventy-fourth year. He was born in Kanawha county, Virginia, April 28, 1774, and joined the M. E. Church in August, 1813. In April, 1814, he was licensed to preach, and continued in the good work upward of 50 years, when an attack of paralysis incapacitated him.

-The Diaspora of the Moravians, is the name for the Synod or governing body of the Moravian Church in America. True to its ancient history, this church is sending out members, under the authority of the Diaspora, to new and destitute places, to preach and gather congregations. They are to visit places where Moravian families are settled. These missionaries have no salary, their travelling expenses only being paid.

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

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
