The Reduction and Pay of the Army, Washington, July 10 .- The House Military Committee were in session to-day and have considered General Schenck's bill to fix and equalize the pay of officers, and to establish the pay of enlisted soldiers of the army. They will report it to the House this evening. It is made to accord with the new bill for the reduction of

This bill provides that the office of General of the Army shall cease as soon as a vacancy oc curs; also the office of Lleutenant-General, It reduces the number of major-generals to four and of brigadiers to eight. It provides that the line of the army shall consist of thirty regiments of infantry, seven regiments of cavalry. and four regiments of artillery. All the bands are to be honorably discharged, except that at the Military Academy.

The President is directed, so soon as the necessitles of the service will allow, to order the muster out of culisted men until the number shall be reduced to twenty-five thousand of all arms of the service.

Sherman's Funding Bill.

Senator Sherman is very sanguine about the success of his Funding bill, but it is the goneral opinion among Sena ors and members that it cannot pass at this session. It will give rise to considerable discussion in the Senate, and will meet with much opposition in the House.

At this stage of the session members are averse to considering financial measures, and exhibit a general anxiety to adjourn, which will defeat many similar projects now pending.

The Hon. Reverdy Johnson, the new Minister to England, has received his instructions from the State Department, and will leave New York on the next steamer. In the matter of the Alabama claims it is understood that Minister Johnson is to take a bold stand, and to insist upon a speedy settlement.

The Adjournment of Congress. It is the general opinion among Senators and members that as soon as delegations from North and South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, and Louisians have arrived here and been admitted, Congress will adjoutn. The disposition is not to adjourn until all these States are admitted,
