A STRIKE RIOT.

The Discontenied somployes of a Mis-souri Railroad Wayiay a Frain. From the St Lou & R publican July 17.

A riot, which thres ened to assume for nidable proportions at the time it occurred, took piace on the Pacific Ba lroad yester iny mornng. Thes en of the dis prosnee was close to the macaune shop, about two miles rom the Seventh Street Dep 4. I was created by some discontented engineers who had lef work, and was participated in by about twenty-four men of this class and breace. The first intimation of the threatened riot was

given shortly be ore 9 o'clock in the morning, when the persons mentioned b gan to congre-gate near the machine shop. Shordy after this, a locomotive, which had come from Franklin. was starting out, when several of these men leaped upon it. It was going at a slow speet. The fireman, who had been lately engaged, jumped off, and tried to es ane, be deeming it perilous to his safety to remain. His efforts to do so were, however fatile, as he was parsied Had not assis ance been at hand it is probable he would have received tatal injuries. It tared rather better with the engineer of the locomotive, for, although well beaten, he was saved

from further injuries. The chief of P lice was notified of the riot, and had a body of 25 or 30 meu q il kly collected on the stol. The rioters, sceing that a slatance was being procured, dispersed, but one of them, a man named Thomas Biley, who put down the breaks of the engine, was arrested. The police prevented any under stoppage of the trans, which ran with accustomed regularity during the day. The Chief left a body of time men under the command of Sergeant O'Neil, to preyeat any further disturbance, and they were relieved at night by a -limitar number.

We learn from Mr. B. Warres, the master mechan c, that the or gin of the disturbance is as follows: - Some days ago one of the engines was taken off this part of the road and trais-ferred to Boon-ville. This left for engines instead of twe, as before, to run between here and Jefferson. But this left the number of miles to be run daily by the engines less than that allotted on the Obio and mealssipol road. The men were spoken to about it, and after ranning a few days they apply d to have another rouning a few days they apply d to have another engine put on. The decomit was made on Wednesday, the Sth instant. Mr. Warren told them he was not in fayor of it, but he would speak to his superior officers about it. He proposed to reter the matter to Mr. Wilson, of the men's society, for decision. but they relu-ed to agr e to it. He next offered to put an ex'ra man on, so that these four engineers would not be overworked, but they demurred to this and said they must have the cogine. He told them that if they were attemp ing to run the road it would not be per-mitted, and on Wednesday he got more men. About twenty-three of the old bands left, under the impression that their places could not be supplied, but they found out their mistake, and the not was the consequence.
