

NEW YORK GOSSIP.

The New Inebriate Asylum—Reckless Conduct of a Police Officer—The Excursion Disaster—Fatal Affair in a Bowery Concert Saloon.

The establishment of the new Inebriate Asylum on Ward's Island is an excellent idea. Heretofore we have done little, if anything, to aid in the reformation of the victims of liquor.

The investigation into the circumstances attending the drowning of the telegraph man Henry Corlett and Miss Jane Bell, from the excursion steamer Seth Low, off the foot of One-hundred-and-fifty-second street, North river, on the 13th instant, was concluded yesterday by Coroner Lynn.

Yesterday afternoon, while Policeman John McNamara, of the seventh Precinct, was being taken to the rear of his residence, No. 325 Monroe street, one of the bullets passed through the fence and entered an open house, where it was a Mrs. Ann Curry, a native of Ireland, aged thirty-six years, and striking her in the back, caused a serious wound.

The convert saloon of Andrew Peterson, located in the basement of premises No. 47 Bowers, was the scene of a terrible affray about 2 o'clock yesterday morning, which resulted in the death of William Cramer, a young German, only nineteen years of age.

A little after noon yesterday a young German, apparently another of the same party, was seen on the Broadway bridge, stopped to inquire the way to Madison lane, when, having learned, he was proceeding that way when he was startled by discovering the chain of his watch breaking loose, and upon examining it, found that his watch was gone.

—Country papers say that the Hon. H. G. Stephens, formerly M. C. from New York, and Judge Pierpont, one of the Justices of Tennessee, will soon declare for Grant.

—The Zanesville (Ohio) Germania, the only German paper published there, and which has hitherto been Democratic, in last week's issue declared for Grant.

—The Honorable James Hughes, of Indiana, one of the most eloquent of the Democratic orators now practicing law in Washington, will return to his State as soon as Congress adjourns, and take the stump for Grant and Colfax.

—A distinguished savant, alluding to Governor Seymour's burlesque, Pompey, N. Y. remarked that he was a former resident of Pompey, and had been recently examined by a party of American antiquaries.

—In Virginia the Democrats have one Sumner, a negro and Virgin son, a delegate to the State against the new Constitution. He is regarded with great favor by the Democracy, and is fully recognized as a "man and a brother."

—"The war is over," said a Seymourite the other day to a one-armed soldier who was turning a hand-organ in Union Park. "It may be over to you," said the brave boy in blue, lifting up his stump, "but it isn't over by a good deal to me."

—The Tennessee rebels, emboldened by the action of the late Democratic Convention and the late of Frank Blair, are seriously contemplating the overthrow of the present Democratic State Government. The Ku Klux Klan men trouble, and are well organized. They warn the negroes that they will not be hurt if they abstain from politics, but the white Republicans are to be murdered without mercy.
