THE DRIVERS' AND CONDUCTORS' PROTECTIVE Association. -This body held an adjourned meeting yesterday afternoon, at the southeast corner of Ninth and Spring Garden streets, for the purpose of receiving a repost from the com-mittee sppointed to memorialize the Board of Presidents upon the subject of an increase of wages and making twelve hours a day's work. The chairman of the committee stated that they had seen the President of the Market street road, who kindly received them, and expressed himself heartily in favor of the movement, and had been for some time endeavoring to adopt some plan by which it could be carried out. The great difficulty was how the desired change could be accomplished. He had, he said, deter-mined to intr duce a reform on his road, whether the other companies joined or not. He recom-mended laterviews with the other Presidents, and thus ascertain their purpose.

As the Bourd of Presidents does not meet again until September, the meeting deter-mined to continue the committee, and instruct the members to furnish to each President a copy of the memorial, which was published but work last week.

The Chair stated that he thought that, whatever action ine meeting should take, should be with discretion, as they were in the hands of these men, who could do as they pleased in the matter. He said that every man who was em-ployed upon a railroad held the position not by choice, but by necessivy; and that, if any of them were to lose their positions there would be no other employment left them. The meeting then adjourned to meet Surday, August 16, when the public are invited to

attend.

AN IMPORTANT DECISION .- In a letter to Assessor John W. Frazier, Commissioner Rollins

renders the following important decison:--"SIR:-1 reply to your letter of the 13th ult., that a person may sell liquors rectified by him at the place of rectification, without thereby incurring liability to special tax besides that of a rectifier; if he sells at his rectifying establish-ment liquors not rectified by him there, he becomes liable to special tax as a liquor dealer; but his sales of liquors rectified by himself at that place are not to be included in determining the extent of his hability as liquor dealer. He should pay a tax of \$2 per thousand upon sales of his own products (i. e., upon liquors of his own rectification) in excess of \$5000.

"If you have been improperly assisted, the Assessor will assist you in preparing your claim for abatement or relanding, as the case may require."

THE TECOPS ON THE PLAINS .- The following particulars of the disposition and expense of our military establishments on the plains of New Mexico, Montana, Dakota, Arizona, and along the line of the Union Pacific Railway, are derived from the recent report of the Quartermaster General, submitted by the Secretary of War to the Senate. By this report it appears that there are 5138 enlisted men, commanded by 194 commissioned and 60 non-commissioned flicers, serving along the line of the Union Pacific Railway between Omaha, Nebraska and Salt Lake City. Along the Eastern division of the same railway there are 2106 privates, under 85 commissioned and 26 non-commissioned officers. In Montana, on the Missouri river, at and below Fort Benton, there are 1903 privates, under 115 officers, commissioned and non-commissioned. In Dakota territory there are 5923 privates, under the command of 236 commissioned and 72 non-commissioned officers. The total expenses of maintaining the troops in the territories of New Mexico and Arizona during the years 1865, '66 and '67,
