A GOLD MINE IN MISSISSIPPI .- The Bolivar (Tenn.) Bulletin, of Saturday, informs us that pay gold is now being dug within a few hours' journey of Memphis, in Tippah county, Miss., which county borders this State, near Lagrange, on the Charleston Railroad. The Bulletin Sava:-

We are creditably informed that gold ore in considerable quantity has been found on the lands of Mr. Ayres, seven miles west of Rip-ley, Tippah county, Mississippi. The dis-covery was made by an old California miner, two or three weeks ago, who revealed the fact to the gentleman owning the land, on the condition that he was to get one half of the mine. About forty or fifty hands are at work in the mine, and so far, have succeeded in making it Great excitement exists in the neighpay. borhood in consequence. The precious metal is found in fine particles, embedded in a kind of scapstone, which, when dried, is pulverized, and then the gold is washed out with a rocker.



A Prominent Californian Forsakes Seymour for Graat,

The following communication was addressed by P. H. Sibley to the Democratic State Central Committee of California, of which he has been until lately a member:--Gestlemen of the Democratic State Central Committee:--I would be doing violence to my

own feelings, and guilty of unfair conduct to you, did I continue longer to share your coun-sels and possess myself of your plans in the coming political campaign. In sentiment and sympathy I am no longer with you. My judgment neither approves the platform of princi-ples put forth by the New York City Convention, nor does my sense of duty to the country justify me in aiding to advance Horatio Seymour to the office of President of the United States. In remembering that I am a Democrat, I cannot formembering that I am a Democrat, I cannot for-get that I owe a higher allegiance to the Ameri-can Union. I should be giad to remain in the Democratic party, could I believe that in doing so I am not sacrificing those principles of patriotism that are higher and holier than any sentiment of mere party fealty. I believe that the war was inau-gurated by the South in the interest of slavery. I believe that it was the dury of the Government I believe that it was the duty of the Government to resist the heresy of secession by arms, believe the calling out of troops, the draft o soldiers, the prosecution of war against Rebellion, was constitutional and necessary for the preservation of the Republic. I believe the emancipation of slaves was necessary and un-avoidable as a war measure. I believe the creation of a national debt grew out of the exigen-cies of a long continued and desperate conflict. I believe the issue of paper currency was an evil incident to the struggle. I believe that the national debt should be paid to the last dollar in coin of the national mint, and that no form or measure of repudiation is consistent with national honor.

I could have supported a War Democrat like Hancock or Hendricks. I could support a Re-publican like Frank P. Blair, Jr., your candifate for Vice-President. His early stand for the rights of the black man; his opposition to slavery; his briting war record, commenting in the streets of St. Long and coding in Sherman's march through Georgia, I approve: but, as I cannot sustain Bia'r without sustaining Seymour, I feel in duty and conscience com-pelled to vote for Grant and Collax. I shall expect the bitter anim dversions of all

who love the Democratic party better than they love their country. I shall expect to have my motives questioned and my hoaor impugned. shall expect to be assalled by partisan malignity, and to have heaped upon me an unlimited amount of personal abuse; but conscious of the rectitude of my motives, and in the confident belief that I am but doing my duty, I have deemed in proper to resign my position as a member of the Democratic State Central Com-mittee. I therefore respectfully tender you my resignation, gratefully remembering our past pleasant relations, and entertaining for you only kind personal feelings. I am, very re-spectfully, gentlemen. P.
