Morris, the present Rector of the parish, Rev. E. R. Lippett, one of his predecessors, and the

Bishop Stevens then made a few remarks touching on the lessons of the day, and before

THE TORACCO LAW .- Under the new Revenue law manufacturers of chewing tobacco (time cut) are compelled to rearrange their packages, in order to comply with the terms of the act which specifies a certain tax, and requires the retail sales to be by weight. The result of this will be that in some kinds of fine cut the papers will contain more tobacco than formerly, and in others they will contain less. Whether the retail price of ten cents the paper will be retained remains to be seen after the law has been in force long enough for manufacturers to determine that question. Starting with three cents the package before the war, fine cut has gradually reached ten cents, and there is every reason to believe that it will go still higher. But the increased cost does not appear to have any effect upon the con-unption of the weed.

NOTICE TO MARINERS

Official notice is hereby a ventual ascrew-pile lighthouse his been creeted in smith's Point Saval, mouth of Points river Virginia. The light will be exhibited for the first time on the evening of September 2, 1898, and every evening thereafter, at which time the light-vessel moored close to the lighthouse for the protection of the work during its progress, will be withdrawn. The lighthouse stands on the edge of the shoal in 12 feet water. Mean tide, with from 4 to 6 fatherns within 150 yards of it to the eastward and 2 latherns on the shoal extending ab ut one mile all round from N.W. by westward to S.W. The iron work of the toundation is painted red, the superstructure is printed white. The liminiarily apparatus is a 3½ order Freenel lens, showing a fixed white light lituminating the entire horizon. The local plane is elevated 38 feet above ordinary sea level, and the light should be seen in clear weather a distance of about 11 nautical miles. A tog-bell, to be rung by machinery, and arranged to be struck uniformly at intervals of 18 seconds, is attached to the light house on its eastern ade. Vessels passing up or down the bay or into Potoms criver, and having from 12 to 14 feet draft of water, may approach the lighthouse sarely to within a distance of 20 yards. Vessels of heavier draft should give it a berth of one third of a mile.
